New York National Guard focuses on families

SARATOGA SPRINGS – Nearly 300 New York National Guard family volunteers, unit representatives and youth leaders spent the weekend of Sept. 17-19 sharing experiences and learning how to strengthen military families.

"The recent symposium is just one more way the National Guard is reaching out to our youth," said Colleen Casey, NY National Guard Youth Program Director.

While the adult leaders discussed the program's finer points, nearly 100 children, ages 6-18, shared a weekend of leadership and team building with Red Cross certified junior counselor and babysitting training courses, various crafts and physical fitness activities, communication skills training and a day at the NYS Museum visiting exhibits, to include the recent addition of the Citizen-Soldier exhibit and enjoying a scavenger hunt and fair.

"It's great to have all these kids come together, because they realize they are not alone, there are a lot of kids dealing with the same issues or circumstances, whether one parent or another is deployed or just returned," Casey said. "They have lots of fun and opportunities to talk about the many things that kids talk about and share their own experiences."

The New York National Guard Youth Program provides skills training in leadership, mentoring, and resource coordination that reflect the unique needs of military children, including deployment issues. It offers safe activities, a place to meet, talk, have fun and develop friendships and bonds with youth who understand each other's issues. Issues such as separation anxiety and an increase in responsibility are addressed by peer members under supervision of caring adult leaders.

The Youth Program offers free counseling, summer camps and support groups to help children of National Guard personnel. "Our youth newsletter, pen pals program and teen council were developed as a means for our youth to communicate and stay involved in issues that pertain to them", Casey added.

The Youth Program is affiliated with Big Brothers, Big Sisters, the YMCA, 4H and the Military Child Education Coalition to ensure resources are available to help them cope with the stress of separation during deployments.

The goal of National Guard Family Programs office is to enhance the quality of life for National Guard members, their families, and the communities in which they live. This is accomplished by building a robust network of trained volunteers allied with government agencies; employers; Veteran & Volunteer Service Organizations, and private businesses in support of all military Service members and their families throughout New York State.



Child Care

Why is child care needed?

Many Active Duty Service Members live in communities where no military child care is available or where there are long waiting lists for child care on the installation.

To meet their needs, the Department of Defense (DoD) has asked the National Association of Child Care Resource & Referral Agencies (NACCRRA) to partner with state and local Child Care Resource & Referral agencies (CCR&Rs) to refer military families to nationally accredited civilian child care programs and help additional civilian child care programs in selected communities become accredited.

The Military Child Care in Your Neighborhood (MCCYN) program also supports the cost of high-quality civilian child care for eligible Service Members.

The civilian child care programs that provide MCCYN are comparable in quality to military-operated on-base programs.

How much will Service Member's costs be reduced through MCCYN?

Fee reductions will vary depending upon total family income, geographic location, DoD child care fee policies and available funding. The fee assistance program is limited to single parent families, families with a working spouse, or a spouse who is enrolled in school. Spouses looking for work are eligible for fee assistance for 60 days.

Examples of programs eligible to participate in MCCYN:

- Nationally accredited child care centers or accredited family child care (FCC) homes
- FCC homes with a CDA-credentialed provider or an FCC provider with an Associate's degree or higher in Early Childhood Education or Child Development

NOTE:

Military Child Care in Your Neighborhood is not an entitlement and is subject to geographic availability of child care and DoD/military Service funding.

MILITARY CHILD CARE IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD

is an initiative to locate and help pay for child care when on-base child care programs are not available or accessible.

Who's eligible?

Children of geographically dispersed **Active Duty** families with no access to on-base child care. Examples include children of Active Duty Recruiters, ROTC Instructors, MEPCOM personnel, Service Members on independent duty assignments and Service Members living in communities that are not within reasonable commuting distances to military installations.

Children of Active Duty families who are wait-listed per Service policy and not currently enrolled in on-base child care.

Note: MCCYN programs may not be available in all locations.

Child Age Groups Served: 6 weeks - 12 years

Child Care Options:

Children may attend civilian child care centers, FCC homes and after-school programs. Children may use full-day, part-day and hourly child care.

This program is subject to geographic location and vacancy.



How does the program work?

- The Service Member, spouse or legal guardian contacts Child Care Aware, a division of NACCRRA, at 1-800-424-2246 or via the web at www.naccra.org/military/assistance.php.
- Staff will ask for some initial information to determine eligibility and child care needs.
- When the child's eligibility is determined, NACCRRA staff will link the Service Member Family to their local CCR&R for help locating an available high-quality child care space.
- Once the child care space is found, the family will complete the fee assistance application.
- Copies of the following documents must be provided as part of the application process:
 - Signed copy of the application
 - Leave and Earnings Statement (LES) for the Service Member
 - Spouse's most recent pay stub or proof of enrollment in school
 - Child(ren)'s birth certificate(s) or self-certification of parenthood
 - Child care provider fee assistance application and required documentation
- As soon as the application and documents are received, the enrollment process begins.
- 7. The enrollment process takes between one and five business days to complete, following receipt of the family's completed application and information from the participating civilian child care program.
- The Service Member Family pays a reduced fee directly to the child care program. The difference is paid to the child care program by the Military Service through NACCRRA.

HELPING CHILDREN COPE DURING DEPLOYMENT

This fact sheet contains useful information for you — parents and family caregivers — to help children cope during a parents' deployment. Experts in military medicine and family trauma who understand the impact of deployment on families have written this fact sheet. It is in the form of commonly asked questions followed by their responses. It is important to remember that while deployments are stressful, they also provide



opportunities for families to grow closer and stronger.

The best way to help children cope is to 1) reassure them that the deployed parent is trained to do his/her job; 2) explain to children that they, too, have a job as part of the family at home who supports our troops and our nation; and, 3) communicate in ways that children can understand according to their age (see sidebar on page 2: Communicating with Children during Deployment).

Commonly Asked Questions from Parents About Deployment

Q. What is the best way to prepare children for deployment?

A. Parents must be honest, and focus on their children's safety, security and continuity of routine. If deployment will change the child's lifestyle such as moving, living with grandparents, or changing childcare, school or community activities, the child needs to hear of these things in advance.

Q. How else can we reassure our children about a deployment?

A. First, parents should digest the information before they communicate it to children so they can deliver it in a calm and reassuring manner. Second, children worry about the safety of the deployed parent. It is important to let children know that the deployed parent is trained to do their job. Third, it is important to communicate in a way that your child will understand based on their age.

Q. How do children signal their distress?

A. Stress affects children like it does adults. Children may complain of headaches, stomach distress and sleep disturbances. They may display moodiness, irritability, low energy, and have more dramatic reactions to minor situations such as stubbing a toe. It can be difficult sometimes to sort out normal distress and more serious problems. If in doubt, seek medical advice.

Q. Are there ways to reduce stress on children during the separation?

A. Yes, one very positive way is emphasize to your children that they have a job that is as REAL as that of the deployed parent. Stress is often the result of feeling helpless or unsure or unclear about a new role or situation. It is important to reinforce that doing well in school, helping out at home and being cooperative is a skill set that is part of their job, one that is valued and unique to their being a military child. When children do their job they help support their parent's mission.

Q. How should school problems be handled?

A. If there is concern about a child's behavior at home, parents should notify the school. Many parents may be reluctant to call attention to their child by warning school officials, but it is important for the school to be alert to any unusual symptoms. If a child has had psychiatric issues before the deployment they are more likely to have problems as a result of the deployment. It is important to talk to your child about any acting out, and get them to discuss their feelings and issues. Your child's school or your primary care doctor can arrange for counseling services.

General Tips for Communicating with Children of Ali Ages

Be careful about sharing your emotions with children. Some parents share too much (losing control in front of kids) or share too little (no emotion or giving the



If the answer is YES to any of these questions, Our Military Kids grant program may be able to help.

Our Military Kids pays the fees for children aged 3 years through 12th grade of deployed Reserve and National Guard to participate in youth sports, fine arts, and tutor programs. This is a way of recognizing the sacrifices the entire family is making while the service member is deployed overseas.

It is simple to apply to the program...

Just fill out the attached Our Military Kids application or download a copy from the website, www.ourmilitarykids.org. Send it in with the required documentation listed on the application including deployment orders, proof of child's dependent eligibility and a flyer or other information that lists the activity and the fee for the activity. The grant will cover up to six mouths instructions, lessons or tutoring for one activity/program, with a maximum grant award of \$500.00 per child. Child may be eligible for a second grant award if the parent's deployment is longer than 365 days. If everything is in order and if funding is available, within two weeks a check will be sent to the organization and the child will be notified of the award. 


