Army National Guard strength ceiling. The result was the consolidation and inactivation of many National Guard units across the country. The State of New York was required to consolidate and inactivate units of the 42nd Infantry Division and other commands within the state. (Annual Report of the Chief of Staff to the Governor, 1957, P. 27)

Effective 15 October 1957, the Chief, National Guard Bureau relieved the 106th Infantry Regiment from assignment to the 42nd Infantry Division and assigned the 106th Infantry Regiment to the 106th Regimental Combat Team.

During the period 1958 through 1960 the US Army developed and tested new divisional, separate brigade and other organizational configurations that came to be known as the Pentomic Army concept. The tests included new numerical designations. Initially the 106th Infantry was redesignated the 1st Battle Group, 223rd Combat Arms Regiment. ¹⁷

The new numerical designations were US Army wide. For the ARNG, the effective date was 16 March 1959 as shown in the following tables and new redesignations. ¹⁸

Effective 1 December 1971 the 1st Battalion (Mechanized), 106th Infantry was reorganized under the new H series Tables of Organization 7-47 H.

The History and Lineage of the 106th Infantry did not pass to the 106th Regiment (RTI). The use of the Distinctive Unit Insignia was authorized to continue the recognition of the 106th Infantry.

A Training Assistance Group of the 106th RTI was attached to the 27th Infantry Brigade Combat Team (IBCT) and deployed with the 27th IBCT to Afghanistan 30 January 2008 for a nine month tour.
