To His Excellency Reuben E. Fenton, Commander in Chief:

Sir: I have the honor to submit the report of the Adjutant General's Department for the year ending December 31st, 1866.

THE VOLUNTEER SERVICE.

Since the date of my last report, the remaining volunteer force of this State, in the service of the United States, has been mustered out and discharged. The last remaining command, namely, a company of the 21st New York Cavalry, was mustered out and discharged at Denver City, Colorado, on the 31st of August last.

The work of securing a complete record of enlistments, musters-in, musters-out and discharge of the volunteer forces of this State, furnished to the war of the rebellion, referred to in my last report, has been very nearly completed. The copying and printing of muster-in rolls of volunteers, commenced in 1863, has been continued with a view to a full and perfect completion of the work, which will doubtless be accomplished within the next annual period. Volume VI will soon be ready for the press.

The importance of collecting, collating and perfecting the records of our volunteers, cannot be over-rated.

THE NATIONAL GUARD.

During the past year a decided improvement in the drill, discipline, and government of the National Guard has been manifested. At no former period in the history of the Militia of the State has the standard of efficiency and military merit ever approached the present period. Especially is this estimate true of the organizations within the limits of the cities and villages of the State, where the men are more easily and oftener assembled. rule, excepting in the more rural and sparsely settled localities, to have regular company drills, and meetings for the instruction of officers, one evening in each week, between the first of November and the first of May. Without regular and frequent meetings for drill and instruction, little can be expected in the way of military attainments. The course of instruction prescribed in general orders has been carefully pursued by all the commands which have attempted to conform to a course of lessons, and the inspection returns justify the opinion that very much has been accomplished by the general observance of the orders on the subject. Necessarily, the duties required to be performed by officers and men, to enable them to attain to a respectable military standing, compel them to give much time to the service; to say nothing of the personal expenses incurred, for which no compensation is allowed, other than what results to the common good, and the appreciation of their military character and standing. Politically, all military organizations must be

non-partisan; socially, they ought to-and in most cases do-result in positive good and advantage to the membership; but these benefits can hardly be estimated to be equal to the personal sacrifices of time and expense involved. That military organization is necessary, and a proper subject of general encouragement, as one of the elements of good government upon which largely depends the safety and protection of the State against invasion, insurrection and disorder, is not to be questioned. Moreover, the State is under binding obligations by Congressional enactment, to organize its territory into division, brigade and regimental districts, and enroll, organize and arm the body of its Militia within such districts, creating and maintaining appropriate staff departments. The obligation, therefore, is mutual between the State and the arms-bearing citizen. While the one owes service, the other is bound to the faithful and continued observance of its obligation to provide the necessary armament and equipment, without which military organization is impossible.

These suggestions are preliminary to urging upon the attention of the Legislature the justice and necessity of granting a liberal support to the National Guard organizations. The results so far attained under the Law of 1862, for providing for the National Guard, ought to be regarded as satisfactory evidence, that with a proper administration of the Military Staff Departments, and an encouraging support by the Legislature, our general system of organization and military instruction, will ensure as perfect and creditable a militia force as a condition of peace will allow.

During the current year, but few new organizations have been authorized, for two substantial reasons. First, the maximum force allowed in time of peace, as fixed by the last Legislature, was already reached. Second, no adequate provision for uniforming, arming and equipping the already organized force, has been granted. In this connection, I respectfully invite attention to the manifest oversight of the Legislature in fixing the limit of organization to fifty thousand (50,000) men in time of peace, and by the same enactment, providing for increasing the rank and file from thirty-two (32) to sixty-four (64) men as a minimum for company organization; especially, as the maximum force allowed was then already organized. In order, therefore, to execute the law, or to entitle the then existing organizations to the provisions therein made for their support, involved disregard of the law in one part, to be enabled to observe it in another; or the disbandment of one-third to one-half of the existing organizations, and recruiting the remainder up to the new fixed minimum of sixty-four (64) men. I feel no hesitation or delicacy in pronouncing upon the propriety of this legislation. Outside of the cities and larger villages, a company organization of sixty-four (64) men would, in most cases, double the extent of the Company Districts, and in order to a company meeting at any given point, would compel a considerable number of the men to travel from five to fifteen miles to reach the point of rendezvous, while a Regimental Parade would double the distance of travel. Again, this large number for company organization is quite unnecessary, and invades the whole system of the peace standard.

Under the law of Congress and the laws of the State, each Regimental District is entitled to its organization; its arms-bearing citizens not members of the organized force are taxed for its support, and each district is entitled to all resulting benefits. Of the one hundred regimental organizations at present existing, not so many as twenty of them have in reality a maximum force of sixty-four (64) men, rank and file, to a company, and such of them (confined to the cities) as have this number, the membership is nominal, above five hundred (500) to six hundred (600) men. Enforcing this law within the current period would deprive more than sixty, if not more than seventy-five of them, of their annual regimental fund, would authorize the boards of supervisors to deprive them of their armories, would refuse to them certificates of organization, and the membership of their privileges and exemptions. By every consideration affecting the interests and integrity of the existing military organizations, I respectfully urge the repeal of the enactment referred to.

The following is a summary of the existing National Guard organizations, viz:

104 regiments of infantry.

3 regiments of cavalry.

I regiment of artillery.

108

I battlion of infantry.

² battalions of artillery

³ batteries of artillery.

¹ battalion of cavalry.

1 independent battery.

2 howitzer batteries.

1 squadron of cavalry.

Of these, several will be disbanded and consolidated. Failing to receive the recommendation of the Inspector-General in the premises, the order therefore will necessarily be deferred for the action of my successor.

The board of officers organized by Special Orders No. 322, October 10th, and convened at the State arsenal, New York city, by Special Orders No. 361, current series on the 18th of December, inst., to test and examine such inventions and improvements in breech-loading arms, and especially, such as might be adapted to the alterations of the Springfield and Enfield rifles into breech-loaders, met at the time and place appointed, continuing its session down to and including the 24th inst., and agreed on a report which has been duly made to your Excellency, with certain recommendations for alterations of the guns now in use by the National Guard. The different inventions, and improvements examined and tested, are specially enumerated in the report to which reference is respectfully made.

THE RESERVE MILITIA.

The number of arms-bearing citizens liable to military duty, designated the Reserve Militia, approximates to three hundred and fifty thousand (350,000) men, as shown by the last biennial enrollment; estimating a few of the more rural regimental districts, where the orders for executing the enrollment were not carried out.

The enrollment made during the past summer, is the

third one which has been attempted since the enactment of the Militia law in 1862. The object of the periodical enrollment is three-fold: First, to ascertain who are liable to military duty, and who entitled to exemption therefrom. Second, to furnish enrollment lists from which to draft persons into the State service as emergencies may require. Third, by the imposition of fines levied and collected as a military tax, to aid in the support of the organized force of the National Guard.

Under the enrollments of 1862 and 1864, no fine or tax was ever levied or collected, and it remains to be seen whether the last enrollment will, in that respect, be any more productive of benefit. In the light of two years' official experience, I venture the opinion, that as the law now stands, no substantial benefit ever will be derived from its attempted enforcement, owing to the necessarily heavy expense attending its execution, and the difficulty of securing such a literal compliance with the legal provisions respecting the time and manner of its performance as will stand the test of legal criticism. In other words, the law is complicated and difficult, if not impossible of execution, and the system a practical failure, so far as the deriving of any benefit from it is concerned. While I shall not, in this connection, make any distinct recommendation for a change of the law on the subject, I may properly, I think, invite attention to it, with a view to a change, and in general terms suggest, that in the interest of a better economy, and that of the National Guard, the law should be greatly simplified in order to make it practically easy of execution, greatly lessen the expense, and

by devoting the avails of fines and taxes to the direct and immediate benefit of the organized commands, without further or other appropriation. These objects can be attained by taking the present enrollment as a basis and making such additions and corrections from period to period as may be required, without the expense and formality of making an entirely new enrollment at every biennial period. All expenses incurred in its execution should be paid out of the fines and taxes collected, and the balance go to the credit of the regimental fund in the district where collected. The territory embraced in the first and second divisions should be a Metropolitan district, with some additional provisions for a board of enrollment; the expenses of which should also be paid out of the moneys collected.

Upon these general propositions as a basis, a law can be framed that will save the taxpayers thousands of dollars, yearly; and without any other provision by way of annual appropriations for uniforms, and the payment of the annual regimental fund of five hundred dollars, secure to each command a larger annual fund for purchasing uniforms and paying expenses than has ever yet been realized out of any legislative provision heretofore made for them.

The accompanying abstract will sufficiently indicate the several subjects comprised in the rosters, returns and reports hereto annexed.

Conclusion.

In conclusion, I take pleasure in acknowledging the uniform ability, industry and courtesy with which I have been supported in my labors in the Department, by my assistants and employees, throughout the period of my administration. To Colonel J. B. Stonehouse, my assistant; to Colonels Gilbert, Baker and Bentley, acting assistants; and my chief clerk, Major Alfred H. Taylor, I am largely indebted for whatever of credit may be accorded to me in my connection with the Department and the administration of its affairs.

REPORTS OF DIVISION AND BRIGADE COM-MANDERS AND BRIGADE INSPECTORS:

REPORT OF BRIGADIER GENERAL LLOYD ASPINWALL, COMMANDING FIRST DIVISION NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 1st Division N. G. S. N. Y., New York, December 31st, 1866.

Brig. Gen. WILLIAM IRVINE,

Adjutant General of the State of New York:

General—In submitting the following brief and imperfect report of this division for the past year, I would respectfully state that, having assumed command, by seniority of rank, only within the past ninety days, and, not having obtained such data from my predecessor in command, as would enable me to complete a satisfactory detailed report, I am compelled to refer you to the reports of the commanders of the 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, and cavalry brigades.

The resignation of Colonel Hamilton, late division inspector, has also deprived me of the assistance of that officer in making up my report.

The division has paraded three (3) times during the year 1866: On the 4th of July; on the 29th of August, to receive the President of the United States, and on November 26th—Evacuation day—the annual fall parade of the division.

Of the parades of the 4th July and 29th August, I find no returns or reports among the few documents I have received from my predecessor in command. From the estimate of Acting Division Inspector Major Wm. B. Burd, the number in line, on the first occasion, may be stated at ninety-four hundred (9400) men in aggregate, and, upon the latter occasion, at ninety-six hundred (9600) men in aggregate.

On the parade of the 26th November, the division was reviewed by his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, and the aggregate present was nine thousand nine hundred and ninety-one (9,991), and was composed of twenty-four regiments of infantry, one regiment of artillery as infantry, and two regiments of cavalry—composing the whole of the 1st division—and one infantry regiment, the 47th, of the 2d division. One battery of the 1st artillery was detached to fire the salutes (National and Governor) of the day. I have to state that the parade was characterized by the utmost promptitude, and that the strength, soldierly bearing, discipline and punctuality of the regiments and brigades afforded general satisfaction and reflected credit upon the division.

The 2d brigade, Brig. Gen. Louis Burger, commanding; the 3d brigade, Brig. Gen. Hall, commanding; the 4th brigade, Brig. Gen. Aspinwall, commanding, and the Cavalry brigade, Brig. Gen. Postley, commanding, were exercised in brigade evolutions, at East New York, in the early part of the year. Of these drills, those of the 2d, 4th and cavalry brigades were satisfactory; that of the 3d brigade, owing to the few movements attempted, gave but little opportunity for judging, as to the proficiency of the command in such evolutions; the changes of front and the advances in line were satisfactorily performed, and the regiments themselves were well handled by their respective commanders.

From my general observation, the division has undoubtedly made very considerable improvement during the past year; and. with the better informed and more energetic officers, particularly line officers, which are being placed in command, happy results may be anticipated in the future. In this connection I would respectfully, but strongly, urge the assembling of the Examining Board, in this city, early in the spring, for the examination of officers of this and the 2d division. I am quite satisfied that the deficiencies in drill and discipline, which exist in the National Guard, are, in a great measure, attributable to the incompetency of the officers. The National Guard is composed—as a rule—of men fully capable of comprehending and practicing that which is imparted to them in an intelligible manner; and to secure the drill and morale desired in the National Guard, no officer should be permitted to retain his commission who is unable to pass a satisfactory examination upon all points upon which he may be returned to the board.

The annual returns in the Inspector General's Department will exhibit the numerical strength of the division, as compared with the returns of 1865.

I am strongly of the opinion that the interests of the State and counties would be advanced by the disbandment or consolidation of such regiments in the National Guard, as continued to fall below the old minimum strength, and which show little or no progress during the past year. So far as my observation and experience teaches me, consolidation of commands leads to no good results—and that disbandment is the only practicable method of dissolving weak and lifeless organizations. Two commands, devoid of internal, strength and vitality, do not obtain either of these requisites by being amalgamated; for, if either possessed the qualities to build up and sustain a proper organization, the necessity for consolidation would not exist.

I would respectfully urge upon you the advantage which would be obtained by the arming of a certain number of the regiments of this division with a breach-loading rifle, either upon the plan of one regiment in each infantry brigade, or of four or five selected regiments, and they to be organized into a rifle brigade. Should the State be in a position to arm the whole division with a breach-loading rifle, the gain would be still greater; but, should such not be the case, I trust that some such plan as suggested above, may be immediately adopted. Certain modifications to the existing military code are, in my opinion, requisite and most desirable, as regards this, and I doubt not other divisions. The requirements upon the men of the National Guard are many, and the laws, enforcing them, strict and unrelenting; and, without advocating any moderation in these respects, I am an advocate of giving the men a tangible equivalent for the duties performed and the time and money spent. I trust that the next assembling of the military convention will be so attended by officers from this division, as will insure the attention and respect of our legislators, and that such recommendations as may be made will be carefully and intelligently considered.

Many of the regiments of the division have been well and liberally provided with armories, and in these the arms and other State property is safe and well cared for; but in many instances better quarters are required; I propose next year, and at an early date, to make a special report in this respect.

I desire, before closing, to state to you the faithful manner in which the officers attached to the staff of this division have performed their duties since my assumption of command.

REPORT OF MAJOR GENERAL H. B. DURYEA, COMMAND-ING SECOND DIVISION NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 2d Division N. G. S. N. Y., Brooklyn, December 20, 1866.

Brig. Gen. WILLIAM IRVINE, Adjt. Gen. State of New York:

General-The undersigned has the honor to report, that the usual division meeting of officers of the second division, agreeably to the regulations, was held in Brooklyn in July last, and that after considering and examining the annual course of instruction in its application to the schools of brigade and division, it was resolved to have a division parade for practice, at the new parade ground in Kings county, provided the State would furnish transportation and subsistence for the brigades out of Kings county. It being found upon consultation with the State officers, that this expense could not be incurred by the State for want of funds, the contemplated parade by division was abandoned, and the seventh brigade, Gen. James Ryder, paraded by brigade at White Plains, Westchester county, in October, and in the same month the sixth brigade, General Hamilton, paraded for three consecutive days in Queens county, and the twenty-second brigade, Gen. W. R. Brown, paraded by regiment, also in October.

At these parades the course of instruction for the year was practiced, and such course has also been practiced, in the 5th and 11th brigades. Many of the regiments are in an excellent state of discipline, well equipped and with superior officers. It is hoped that by careful attention during the coming year, all the regiments in this division will be advanced in instruction and efficiency, so as to come up to the proper standard.

The usual fourth of July parade in the city of Brooklyn, was dispensed with, as an appropriate and merited tribute of respect to the memory of Lieutenant General Winfield Scott, then lately deceased.

I attended, with members of my staff, at the continuous parade or encampment of the sixth brigade; and I was also present, with my staff, at a parade ordered by me, of the fifth and eleventh brigades, in the city of Brooklyn, on the 25th day of October last, on the occasion of the presentation by the city of Brooklyn of honorary medals to the volunteers of the war, from Kings county. This was an event of much interest, and His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, and his staff, honored us with their attendance. The Governor reviewed the volunteers, in number about four thousand, and commanded by General Roberts. The fifth and eleventh brigades were also to have been reviewed by His Excellency at the close of the ceremonies of presentation; but this was prevented by the necessary departure of His Excellency before that period.

REPORT OF MAJOR GENERAL S. S. BURNSIDE, COMMANDING FIFTH DIVISION NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 5th Division N. G. S. N. Y., Oneonta, December 3, 1866.

Brig. Gen. Wm. Irvine, Adjutant General State of New York:

General—In submitting my report for the present year, I deem it a duty not only to give a succinct history of the military proceedings of the division, but also to point out the defects of our system, proved by its practical operations. That one object in requiring reports from commanding officers was to inform the Department of the practical working of the system, and such suggestions as would in the opinion of officers remedy the defects.

Convinced that no militia organization can be efficient and reliable without proper discipline, I have endeavored to enforce the salutary rules of discipline and subordination. In doing so I have necessarily incurred the displeasure of those who were subject to the same, but while I have discharged the duties of the commandant of this division, the rules governing the Militia forces have been enforced without fear or favor.

To the credit of the officers of the division, but few cases have occured calling for courts-martial, to deal with delinquent officers.

Two important trials were had in the 108th regiment and 18th brigade, during the past year. The commandant of the regiment was cashired and fined, and also the surgeon of the said regiment. The charges were of a grave and serious character, involving the reputation of these officers and the interest of the regiment, and could not be tolerated without doing great injustice to the 108th regiment, and the service generally.

The 108th regiment has been very fortunate in selecting for colonel, a gentleman of experience, of high standing as a citizen and soldier. Colonel Ferguson has seen service, as a captain of the National Guard, and as colonel of the 152d regiment of N. Y. S. Volunteers, and with the excellent material in the county of Schoharie, no doubt exists but what in a brief period, the regiment will take its place as one of the best regiments in the division.

The annual meeting of the officers of the division for theoretical instruction in the evolutions of the line, was held on the 27th and 28th days of June last, at Schoharie Court House. At said meeting a system of tactics, in accordance with the United States system, was adopted, and the system made uniform throughout the division, and the course of instruction prescribed by the commander-in-chief exemplified and demonstrated. The duties of the officers in making the enrollment were fully discussed, and its importance impressed upon the commandants of regiments.

Although these annual meetings of the officers are expensive, the officers of this division have cheerfully attended, and have produced a uniformity of action, inspired a laudable rivalry, and much useful information is imparted by a friendly interchange of views, and especially with the new and inexperienced officers.

I am informed that a very thorough, fair and impartial enrollment was made, of the reserved Militia, in every company district, and that the absentees on the first Monday of September were properly returned to the supervisors. It is a source of congratulation, not only to the Militia, but to the taxpayers at large, that the civil authorities have cheerfully performed their duties in allowing the amounts for regimental and company armories, and have made out their warrants to collect the fines of the reserved Militia. This is a new idea with these officers, and speaks well for their intelligence and a desire to carry out the law of the State. The result will be a large addition to the military fund of the several regiments.

There having been no encampments in the division for several years, I was very anxious to try the system, and your Department very generously granted me an order for all the tents and camp equipage at your disposal, which was only enough to encamp two regiments at a time.

The 27th and 100th regiments, in the 18th brigade, encamped at Delhi, Delaware county, by the order of Brig. Gen. Danforth, commanding, commencing on the 10th of September, for six consecutive days. Although the weather was somewhat inclement, it was a decided success. Gen. Danforth and staff encamped with the troops, and conducted the encampment in an officer-like manner.

Col. Oliver, commanding the 27th regiment, and his officers, entered their tents at the commencement and did not leave the camp until its close. By their example, the officers and soldiers of the 27th regiment behaved like veterans, and good order prevailed. The officers and soldiers of the 100th regiment likewise behaved well and rendered good service.

I visited the encampment, accompanied by my staff, and remained with the troops, and on Friday reviewed the regiments. It rained a heavy shower, still every officer and private present remained in his place and did duty in a soldier-like manner.

The 39th and 41st regiments, 17th brigade, were encamped by my order, by and with the consent of the Commander-in-Chief, at Oneonta, Otsego county; commencing on the 17th of September, to continue for six consecutive days. The regiments assembled in good numbers, and on Tuesday we numbered 1,100 men. A storm commenced on Monday evening and continued, with but slight intervals until Saturday morning. Notwithstanding this embarrassment, officers and soldiers vied with each other in the prompt discharge of their duties; and the guard mounting and the duties of the sentinel were well performed, and good order was maintained in camp without any punishment, except in one case, for theft.

Colonels Hubbard and Dunbar discharged their duties with commendable promptness and ability.

On Tuesday we were visited by Inspector General Batcheller, who made a minute inspection of the encampment, and witnessed the evolutions of the regiments; and on Wednesday reviewed the regiments, and expressed himself highly gratified with the manner in which it was conducted, and the discipline of the troops.

The Inspector General was received with the honors due his rank, and was highly applauded by the troops. His gentlemanly and officer-like conduct won for him the esteem of both soldiers and citizens.

On Thursday, amidst a terriffic storm of rain, His Excellency Governor Fenton and staff arrived, and were escorted by a detachment of the 39th regiment, commanded by Col. Petrie, division engineer, to his quarters. When the rain had somewhat abated, the Governor and staff were escorted to the encampment, where he was received with the honors due his exalted rank. His Excellency and staff, the commandant of the division and staff, reviewed the regiments. The rain again commenced; the troops were massed on the right, when the commander-in-chief, in a short and impressive address, gave them every encouragement, expressed himself satisfied with their appearance and explained to them why they were not fully uniformed, which refuted the false statements that the officers were to blame because the regiments were not fully uniformed and paid. The address of the Governor was patriotic, and showed him to be the true friend of our militia system.

The next encampment was held by order of Gen. Brown, at Ballston Spa; the 29th regiment, commanded by Col. C. T. Peek.

I regretted exceedingly that I was unable to attend said encampment, having to attend our circuit court, then in session in our county. I am informed that the encampment was well conducted, and the regiment was reviewed by the Governor and his staff.

I cannot too earnestly entreat your Department to urge upon the Legislature the importance of providing tents and camp equipage for each regiment that is fully organized and equipped, to be kept at their armories. It would save the cost of transportation, and the damage done the same. It would encourage the regimental officers to renewed exertions.

Allow me to point out a practical defect in our State system, which must be speedily remedied. The fine for non-attendance of a member of the National Guard for six days is only six dollars, when it is the same for one day at a regimental parade. At encampments, when the men have to travel some distance, there are many who prefer to run the risk of the fine than to be at the expense of attending; and the returns show that many more were absent this year than last. There is too much leniency in the battalion courtsmartial; too many are excused on frivolous pretences, and fines

are not imposed or collected. These courts must be regularly held; the fines imposed and collected promptly. The law has given the officers full power to collect these fines, and unless they are collected a large decrease in our regiments will assuredly take place.

The repeal of the law, in 1865, allowing exemptions, also prevents enlistments; and unless the members of the National Guard are allowed exemptions, or furnished with rations or sufficient compensation to remunerate them for their actual expenses, no new enlistments can be obtained, and when the term of these men expire a resort to a draft will be necessary to fill up the companies. All experience has shown that the volunteer system is decidedly the best, as the drafted men generally do duty reluctantly. The men who do duty cheerfully should be rewarded, while those who neglect their duty should be compelled to compensate those who perform it. The inadequacy of the appropriation has not only embarrassed your department, it has also been a source of much difficulty with the commandants of regiments; by the distribution of 350 uniforms to regiments containing 800 men, they have been embarrassed how to divide these uniforms to give satisfaction. Some have given a few uniforms to each company. This has created dissatisfaction in every company.

On application to me, I advised them to uniform the oldest organized companies in their regiments, and especially where those companies have once, at their own expense, furnished their own uniforms, and worn them out in the service. This has left two or three companies in each regiment ununiformed. But we have required no further duty of these companies than a muster and inspection, until they procure their uniforms.

It is consistency and stability that gives character and efficiency to any system, and particularly a military system; and this has been the great desideratum for which the officers have for years labored.

The sacrifices in time and money by the officers and privates of the volunteer militia of this State have been incalculably great, and far exceeds the bounds of duty which the public can of right claim from any one class of men.

A tax for the support of our common schools is justified on the ground that education is the means of protection of life, liberty and property. This is conceded; the inference is just and the argument legitimate; but this protection is incidental and remote, while the

protection afforded by the military organization is direct and immediate.

The commandants of the 13th, 18th and 19th brigades reviewed their brigades as required by law the present year. The officers and soldiers of this division have generally performed their duty with promptness, and their general good conduct enrolls them as worthy members of the National Guard of our great State.

To His Excellency, the Commander-in-Chief and heads of departments, in behalf of the division, I tender our thanks for their uniform kindness and courtesy, and their aid in fostering and encouraging us in our arduous labors, satisfied that every effort has been put forth within the means at their command.

To my personal staff, where all have done their duty nobly, it would seem invidious to discriminate. But the labors of the encampment have been chiefly performed by Col. Uebel, division inspector, and Lieut. Col. Wing, quartermaster. They have labored incessantly to secure the State property entrusted to their care.

Col. Uebel displayed good judgment in laying out the encampment, and Col. Wing exerted himself, with the aid of the regimental quartermasters, to provide for the wants of the men.

The hospital department, under the direction of Col. Cooke, assisted by Major's Spencer and Root, was well conducted. But one or two cases of sickness occurred during the encampment, and they were speedily restored.

REPORT OF BRIGADIER GENERAL PHILIP S. CROOKE, COMMANDING FIFTH BRIGADE.

Headquarters 5th Brigade N. G., Brooklyn, November 30, 1866.

To Adjutant General WILLIAM IRVINE:

General—I have the honor to report the 5th brigade N. G. in a flourishing condition, and competent and ready for active service if they should be needed.

The 14th regiment, having served more than three years in the United States service, and with many of the officers and men continuing to do duty in the regiment, are veterans.

The 13th and 28th regiments were each several times in the United States service during the rebellion, and also have many officers and men experienced and capable of immediate duty.

The commandants of these regiments, Colonel Jourdan (Brevet Major General) of the 13th, Colonel Fowler (Brevet Brigadier General) of the 14th, and Colonel Urban of the 28th, have each been field officers in the United States service during the rebellion, and are most efficient officers for any service.

The 70th regiment, commanded by Colonel Cropsey—cavalry and artillery—although they have not been in the United States service, yet have done much useful and valuable service at home during the war. Their commandant, Colonel Cropsey, is a most valuable and zealous officer.

The battalion of heavy artillery commanded by Major Sprague is a well drilled and serviceable corps. Their commandant is undoubtedly unsurpassed as a master of drill.

The brigade, since the close of the rebellion and the return of many of its old members from the mustering out of the Union army, has increased largely in numbers. During the war it was truly a recruiting school for the United States service. Its members have left their marks and their bodies on many of the bloody battle fields. It is the duty as well as the honest pride of their commandant to place on record the story of their patriotism, and to claim for them an equal place with any corps of citizen soldiers.

The numerical force of the brigade is over 2,000 men, fit for immediate service.

REPORT OF W. G. WARD, COLONEL COMMANDING FIRST BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 1st Brigade, N. G. S. N. Y., New York, December 24th, 1866.

Brig. Gen. Wm. IRVINE, Adj. Gen'l S. N. Y., Albany:

Sir—Pursuant to paragraph 527 General Regulations, I have the honor to transmit herewith the reports of the 2d, 12th and 71st regiments of infantry in this brigade.

No reports have been received, although summarily ordered, from the 77th and 99th regiments, nor from the captain commanding the 73d.

I regret to say that the records of the brigade show that, under the command of my predecessor, no evolutions of the line have been practiced in this brigade, and but one meeting of the officers for instruction, held under my orders on 11th instant, at State arsenal.

The brigade has been paraded, under orders from the commanding General of the 1st division, three times, when the usual ceremonies of a public parade and review were performed.

The state of instruction is, in my opinion, very good in the 71st and 12th regiments; fair in the 2d, and very bad in the 77th and 99th regiments. These last, however, have undergone many recent internal changes, and may show a marked improvement by the next annual inspection.

In conclusion, I beg to state that I assumed command of the brigade pursuant to special orders, No. 325, from general head-quarters, S. N. Y., on 16th October last. The preparations for the fall inspections, already ordered, prevented my assembling the brigade for instruction previous to 1st November, and the shortness of the days and inclemency of the weather has prevented its assembly since.

In paragraphs Nos. 2, 3 and 4, Regimental General Orders No. 9, from these headquarters, dated the 27th September, 1866, I instituted drills for officers and non-commissioned officers in the elementary principles of Casey's system, with instruction in forms of parade, and the practical working of the details of organization, in accordance with the military Code. Those meetings have been continued, and the order is still in force. Officers meeting on Saturday evenings, and non-commissioned officers on Thursday evening of each week, at the 13th Street Armory.

In regimental general orders No. 10, October 3d, 1866, the regiment was ordered for drill at the State Arsenal in the details of inspection. Brigade orders were also promulgated for the annual inspection and review.

REPORT OF BRIGADIER GENERAL LOUIS BURGER, COMMANDING SECOND BRIGADE.

Headquarters 2d Brigade N. G. S. N. Y., New York, December 20, 1866.

Brig. Gen. Wm. IRVINE,

Adjutant General of the State of New York:

General—In compliance with par. 527 of the General Regulations, I hereby transmit the reports of the commandants of the several regiments of this brigade, as far as they have been handed in at these headquarters.

I beg leave to report that I have exercised the commissioned officers and non-commissioned staff in the school of the battalion,

[Assem. No. 242.]

Casey's Tactics, at the State Arsenal, on March 7th, March 29th and April 20th.

Pursuant to General Orders No. 7, from General Headquarters, dated May 7th, 1866, this brigade was exercised in the practice of evolutions of the line, on the 28th of May last, at East New York. The six infantry regiments were formed in two lines, viz: the 3d, 5th and 6th regiments on first line, and the 12th, 84th and 96th regiments on second line. The 1st Artillery paraded with one full mounted battery, and one mounted company for guard and escort duty; the remainder were drilled dismounted, in the school of company. Major Richard O'Grady, 1st Artillery, was appointed field officer of the day.

The following evolutions were made:

Close column by division on 1st division 1st battalion, march in column.

By battalion in mass on the 1st battalion deploy column.

By battalion in mass on the 3d battalion right in front into column.

By battalion in mass on the 6th battalion deploy column.

By battalion in mass on the 2d battalion right in front into column.

To deploy faced to the left, by battalion in mass, change direction by the right flank.

The three left battalions moved to the rear 150 paces from the 1st line.

On the 1st division, 2d battalion, first and second lines, deploy masses.

March in advance 2d battalion of direction and halt.

Loading and firing of the 1st line by battalion and by file 2d line, pass the line in front, deploy and loading and firing; the bat-

tery taking position on the right joined the fire of the infantry; 2d line pass the 1st line in retreat.

Change of front, forward on the right of the 1st line. Review by Major General C. W. Sandford and staff.

The evolutions were made with promptness and regularity by the different battalions.

To the field and brigade staff officers were explained, by diagrams and recitations, the various evolutions of the line, at meetings on two consecutive days, as required by the General Regulations

The 12th regiment infantry was transferred from this brigade to the 1st brigade, by Special Orders No. 325, from general headquarters.

This regiment had no armory until May, and the one it has now is not large enough to drill a company, and totally unfit for an armory. We have no arm rack nor any accommodations whatever to keep our arms in good condition; but it was the best that I could get at that time from the supervisors.

At the battalion drills the following exercises were had: Formation of battalion, manual of arms, loading and firings, ployments from line of battle into column, deployments from column into line, changing of fronts, forward and to the rear, on the several companies forming and reducing squares, street firing advancing and in retreat.

The companies have drilled semi-monthly, with the exception of July and August, at which they have been instructed in the school of the soldier and company.

This regiment is improving in discipline, and gradually increasing, and is now in want of 100 uniforms, and I have every reason to believe that in another year it will rank with some of our best regiments in the city.

General—I have the honor to submit herewith the following report of the various drills and occasions of instruction and exercise had in this regiment during the year ending this day:

Regimental parades, six, viz.: On November 24th, 1865 (celebration of Evacuation Day); January 25th, 1866 (funeral of Dr. S. Brilliantowsky, late surgeon of the 41st regt. N. Y. V., and acting division surgeon); May 25th, 1866 (brigade practice in evolutions of the line, at East New York); July 4th, 1866; August 29th, 1866 (reception of President Johnson); October 12th, 1866 (annual inspection).

Battalion drills, at the State arsenal, corner 7th avenue and 35th street, four, viz.: On January 23d, February 5th, February 19th, and March 30th, 1866. These drills were wing drills, each lasting from 8 to 10 o'clock P. M.

The commissioned officers and non-commissioned staff officers of this command participated on three occasions, in conjunction with the officers and non-commissioned staff officers of all the other regiments of the second brigade, in the practical instructions in the school of the battalion, at the State arsenal, on March 7th, March 29th and April 20th, 1866, from 8 to 10 o'clock, P. M., yourself acting as instructor thereat.

On June 21st, 1866, in the afternoon, a skeleton drill, with all the commissioned and non-commissioned officers of this regiment, was held at Mount Morris Square in this city.

The commissioned officers assemble at 8 o'clock, P. M. on every third Friday of each month, for theoretical and practical instruction and for the transaction of the administrative business of the regiment, at the regimental armory, 291 Bowery.

All the non-commissioned officers of this command assemble for drill and instruction, at 8 o'clock, r. m., on every first Friday of each month, at the regimental armory, except during the period from June 15th till September 15th. These are standing orders since November 1st, 1865.

On account of insufficiency of available drilling room at our armory, drills by divisions, the frequent occurrence of which is so very desirable, could not be held there, for the same reason only one company can drill there at a time. The different companies and the drum corps are therefore only able to drill about once every fortnight, except during the above stated term. These drills generally last from 8 till 10 o'elock, P. M.

The regiment was, during the past year, liberally supplied with quartermaster and commissary stores by the respective general departments, which fact I beg to gratefully acknowledge here. It would be very desirable to have the Enfield rifled muskets in our possession soon exchanged for a better and more efficient weapon.

I do not think, General, that I am assuming too much in stating, in conclusion of this report, that, in my modest opinion, this regiment, as a young organization, has made considerable progress during the past year in its strength, discipline and general efficiency.

General—In compliance with orders, on the 11th and 12th of October, I inspected the several regiments of this brigade, and in submitting a general report, I will simply state that there has been a most marked improvement in the discipline, appearance and esprit du corps of the several regiments.

The 5th and 6th regiments, however, have suffered somewhat in drill and discipline from the loss of their old commanders, but now that Colonel Mason has been reinstated as colonel of the 6th, and Lieutenant Colonel Anton Meyer has been made full colonel of the 5th, these regiments, I have no doubt, will soon more than regain what has been lost from want of permanent commanders.

The arms and uniforms of the 6th regiment are worn out and unfit for service and should be replaced to make them an efficient corps in case of riot or invasion.

The arms of the 96th regiment are in good condition, but the parts of one piece will not fit another, and the shanks of the bayonets are so short as to prevent the stacking of arms, unless it is accomplished by means of the ramrod, which often bends the rods, and as each rod will fit but one piece, the rifle is of course

made useless until the rod is repaired. For the above reasons, it seems to me important that new arms should be given in place of these.

The 3d regiment is very much in want of armory accommodations and furniture. They have but one drill room and but one meeting room for officers and men, and they are obliged to put their arms in packing boxes, which makes it very difficult to keep them in order.

Hoping that you will be able to remove some of the above mentioned obstacles to the progress and improvement of the regiments of this brigade,

General—I have the honor to report that consequent on the retirement of Brigadier General William Hall, from this brigade, I assumed its command (in obedience to orders from general head-quarters and by virtue of seniority of rank) on the 26th of September last.

Since that time no brigade drill has taken place, as the time has been fully occupied in the annual inspection of the several regiments of the brigade.

The regimental reports as required by the General Regulations (paragraph 527) are transmitted herewith.

The several regiments were inspected as follows:

7th regiment, October 2d, 1866. 37th8th, 1866. do $55 \mathrm{th}$ 9th, 1866. do9th do19th, 1866. 1st do 26th, 1866. 8thdo 27th, 1866.

Full returns of which have been forwarded to your department by the brigade inspector in accordance with law. On Monday, 26th November last, this brigade paraded agreeably to division orders. On this occasion, the 47th regiment of infantry, Colonel J. V. Messerole, about 400 strong, from Brooklyn, one of the most efficient regiments of the second division, paraded with this command.

General—In compliance with special orders No. 14, I have the honor to report that since my regiment was organized in November, 1865, we have made the following parades, viz: June 5th, 1866, the anniversary of the departure of the 9th N. Y. Volunteer Infantry for the seat of war in 1861; the 4th of July; the reception of the President of the United States, and the 25th of November, making in all four regimental parades in the year 1866.

We have had four battalicn drills in the year, and have been through about two-thirds of the movements and formations laid down in the School of the Battalion of "Casey's Tactics."

Excepting the months of June, July, August and September, each company has drilled three times in each month in the School

of the Soldier, Company, Manual of Arms, and some of the companies have made considerable progress in the bayonet exercise.

The drills of the regiment have not been as frequent as they would have been under more favorable circumstances.

The only assistance the regiment has received from the State up to this time, is that we have been allowed to draw four hundred muskets, unfit for use, and four hundred sets of accourrements, with nearly leather and copper enough in each set to make a harness for a moderate sized dray horse. The uniforms have been furnished by the members (officers and enlisted men) of the regiment, and until the 25th of November last, we have had to provide our own armory. At that time we moved into one of limited capacity, rented by the county authorities, about large enough for company meetings, and a storehouse for state property.

Next year when we are more perfectly organized, we hope to comply with more promptness to all the formalities necessary to the good government of an efficient National Guard.

REPORT OF MAJOR ROBERT TAYLOR OF THE FOURTH BRIGADE, NATIONAL GUARD.

To General W. Irvine,

Adjutant-General of the State of New York:

General—The annual inspection of the 4th brigade commenced on the 22d of October, being preceded by an inspection of the general commanding the 1st division and his staff, also of the troop known as "Otto's," detailed specially for escort duty, in which it is serviceable.

The uniform is showy, therefore appropriate. To be efficient for any other service, it would require more drilling. The troop consists of 60 members, and had present at inspection 1 captain, 3 licutenants, 5 sergeants, 4 corporals, and 33 privates—total 46. The captain complains of the want of uniforms.

The inspection of the brigade proper, commenced with the 4th regiment (Zouaves), which consists of 8 companies, and had a total present of 345, including a band of 25 pieces. The absentees numbered 271. Total strength of regiment 617. The uniforms, arms and equipments being new, were in excellent condition.

The 11th regiment maintains its strength and vigor. It consists of 10 companies, and has an aggregate strength of 661, exclusive of field, staff and band. At this annual inspection, 559 were present, and the average strength of each company present was 50 men, exclusive of line officers, all of which, with one exception, were present. The arms and equipments were in satisfactory condition. The armory accommodation of this regiment is entirely inadequate, and I respectfully suggest that some special action be taken by the proper military authorities to secure for this regiment such an armory as its strength and uniform attention to duty entitle it, and to this end I also suggest the propriety of the erection on the west front of Tompkins square, one or more iron buildings 200 feet long by 70 wide, and 3 stories high—the first or ground floor to be made to open towards the square when necessary. This would be utilizing space that is now useless, and besides affording armory accommodation above, would form a place of retreat for regiments or the police force, drilling there, when suddenly overtaken by rain or snow.

The 22d regiment, consisting of 8 companies, had an aggregate strength present at inspection of 525. The total strength of this regiment is 732. The average strength of the companies present, exclusive of line officers, was 58. The famous company B, Capt. Remmey, had 114 men present, and was numerically stronger than the 95th regiment at inspection, whose aggregate rank and file present was just 110.

The discipline of the 22d is all that is desirable; their arms and equipments are in perfect order, and the appearance of the men was in the highest degree soldierly.

The 69th regiment, inspected on the 23d October, was present with a total of 347. The absentees were 1 field and 1 staff offi

cer, 4 non-commissioned, 2 lieutenants, 4 sergeants, 5 corporals, 4 drummers, and 134 privates—total absentees 155. The numerical strength of this regiment, exclusive of band, is 482. The arms and equipments were in good order, and, with the exception of a variety of belt plates, were accountered uniformly.

The 79th regiment having partially recovered from the shock of more than 20 battles in which it was engaged during the rebellion, appeared on the occasion of its first annual inspection under arms since its resuscitation, on the 24th of October. With only 7 companies, it had a total present of 257, and had uniforms been supplied, at least 100 more would have been added to the number. The absentees were 1 field and 8 line officers, 6 sergeants, 5 corporals, 2 drummers, and 100 privates—total 122. Aggregate strength 379. A new company is forming and nearly ready for mustering in. The uniforms, arms and equipments being new, were in perfect order.

The men were soldierly and gave every evidence of discipline and drill. The resuscitation of this regiment having been slow, has resulted in an aggregation of reliable men, betokening steady increase, on which the State can surely depend at all times. While other militia regiments that volunteered for the war have been reimbursed for the loss of their uniforms worn out in the service, the 79th has not received a farthing.

This is unjust, and I respectfully ask your intercession in behalf of this regiment, to the end that those members who suffered loss may be repaid to the uttermost, particularly as the military record of the regiment was one continuous act of heroism throughout the way.

The 95th regiment is one of the many that was conceived and born in the political iniquities of 1863, and after receiving the remains of several similar organizations, has a consolidated muster roll of 500 names, represented by 8 skeleton companies. It was to have been inspected on the 24th of October, but owing to the fact that several of the captains had not made out their rolls, and as insubordination appeared to be the rule, particularly with men in the rear companies, who broke from the ranks and fled, setting at defiance all authority, I declined proceeding with the inspection, and reported the facts to Col. Maidhof, commanding the brigade, who issued a special order, directing an inspection of the 95th to take place on the 14th of November, on which date it was present in the following strength:

The absentees were 3 captains, 11 lieutenants, 18 sergeants, 18 corporals and 350 privates. Making a total of absentees of 400.

The officer commanding this regiment, Lieut. Col. McElroy, has faithfully endeavored to make a good regiment of the 95th, but on the occasion of this inspection admitted his inability.

With the single exception of the 95th, the other regiments of this brigade maintain their strength—indeed are increasing, and are entitled to the fostering care of the State.

REPORT OF J. DOWNING, BRIGADE INSPECTOR SIXTH BRIGADE, NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 6th Brigade N. G., S. N. Y. Mineola, November 20th, 1866.

To the Adjutant General State of New York:

Dear Sir—As Brigade Inspector of the 6th Brigade N. G., S. N. Y., I have the honor to report that I herewith send muster and inspection rolls of the several companies of the several regiments in the brigade, all of which have been inspected and mustered as the law directs. This organization has improved very much since our last year's inspection, but much remains yet to be done. The fifteenth is now, and has been for the last year practically without a commanding officer, Col. Willis being absent and showing a total indifference to the interests of the regiment. With irregular and old uniforms and but few arms, the men are generally very much discouraged and demoralized. With a good officer in command

and a sufficient number of good uniforms, arms and equipments, there is no reason why this would not be a first class regiment.

The 89th regiment is commanded by Col. Aaron Degrauw, and the uniforms, arms and equipments indicate that great care has been observed to preserve them from wear and damage. The discipline and drill of this regiment shows to the causual observer, conclusively, what is a well known fact, that the commandant is entirely ignorant of both. With a little attention and a good drill officer to command this might be made a very good regiment.

The 16th regiment is commanded by Col. Alfred Wagstaff. It numbers five hundred men and is well officered, and splendidly uniformed, armed and equipped, and well drilled and disciplined. Should occasion require, this regiment, at the shortest possible notice, might be placed into the field for active service.

This organization is scattered all over Suffolk county, separated by various distances from five to seventy miles between the companies, all however, along the line of railroad, but nothing except the most unremitting efforts on the part of its most active and energetic commandant could ever have brought it up to its present splendid condition. The 16th regiment will compare favorably with any of the city regiments, and does honor to the National Guard.

The 6th brigade was ordered by Brig. Gen. Hamilton to report at the Queens county agricultural fair grounds at Mineola, on the 18th of October last, and made arrangements for its encampment there two days. This was for the purpose of review and inspection. Col. Wagstaff with the 16th regiment reported promptly, and obeyed all orders faithfully in spirit and letter. Col. Aaron Degrauw with the 89th regiment reported the morning of the 18th October, and refused to stay longer than one day, but most of the regiment volunteered to stay, and did remain to be reviewed on the 19th. The 15th regiment, under command of Major Craft, reported promptly on the 18th, and endeavored to do all that they could do in their disorganized state. On the 19th October the brigade was inspected and reviewed by Brig. Gen. Batcheller, Inspector General of the State, and also by Maj. Gen. Duryea, commanding second division.

I have endeavored to furnish proper and correct muster and inspection rolls of all the companies, but I know that many of them are imperfect. It is impossible for me to return them to the respective companies after receiving them, no matter how imper-

fect or incorrect they may be, on account of the distance, some being a hundred miles away, and although orders were promulgated to the effect that every company commander should have his rolls ready at the time the inspection was ordered, most of them failed to do so, and I was compelled to wait some time after inspecting them, to get their rolls, and then corrected them and made them as complete as I could. My consolidated report will show the real strength and condition of each regiment. I know it to be correct.

REPORT OF JAMES RYDER, BRIGADIER GENERAL, SEVENTH BRIGADE, NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 7th Brigade N. G. S. N. Y., South East, November 20th, 1866.

Gen. William Irvine, Adjutant General N. G. S. N. Y.:

General—I have the honor to report that the Seventh Brigade continues the same as at the time of my last annual report, as to regimental and company organization, but improving in discipline and experience of the officers and men of the command.

I attended the regimental drills of the 17th and 18th Regiments in June last, by official invitation, and witnessed the practice of the evolutions required by your general order.

The weather was very unfavorable for the 17th, but the 18th Regiment had a very fair day, and performed all the evolutions as required by general orders No. 1 from these headquarters, which I send you.

The inspection was performed by members of the brigade staff and brigade inspector, by companies, at the respective company armories, with two or three exceptions in the 57th Regiment. I also send you an order in relation thereto.

The annual review was by brigade on the 10th of October, at the fair grounds of the Westchester County Agricultural Society, near White Plains.

The 17th, 18th and 57th regiments were present in uniforms, the same as those of the former report, and in very respectable numbers.

Col. Liebeneau, of the Inspector General's Department, was present, and witnessed the performance of several evolutions by brigade and the marching review.

I reviewed the brigade with my staff attending, after which there were several evolutions performed by brigade, very creditably.

After breaking from line into column, and moving from column into line, these among others were performed:

Close column by division on the first division first battalion right in front. By battalion in mass on the first battalion deploy column. Battalion in mass on first battalion take deploying intervals. On first division deploy column, and others.

The field officers have the confidence of their commands, and on the whole there is much improvement. With uniforms enough to supply our demands, we hope to have full regiments. I would here state that I believe it to be a very general desire by the people, as well as the members of the National Guard, that a sufficient appropriation should be passed to drill the National Guard by division or brigade encampments. It is thought to be decidedly wrong and unjust to require the members of the various regiments in the country to attend the regimental parades, paying their own car fares and other expenses without any compensation or exemptions. This would be corrected by having encampments. This brigade district, for instance, is sixty miles long and forty wide, and to call the men to a parade incurs necessarily great personal sacrifices. Let the appropriation be passed by the Legislature that justice may be done.

REPORT OF W. H. LAWTON, MAJOR AND INSPECTOR OF THE TENTH BRIGADE, NATIONAL GUARD.

Office of the Brigade Inspector, 10th Brigade, 3d Division, N. G. S. N. Y.,
Troy, November 20th, 1866.

To Gen. WM. IRVINE, Agj't Gen'l State of New York:

General—Pursuant to paragraph 670, General Regulations, I have the honor to submit the following report of the 10th brigade, comprising, as reported last year, five regiments, viz: 24th, 30th, 72d, 97th and 111th. The 24th regiment, Colonel Isaac

McConihe, jr., was inspected, and mustered five companies, September 26th, and five companies on the 27th.

At the last annual inspection the regiment numbered, present, a total of 528—161 more than at this inspection. The 24th is not what it should be in regard to drill and discipline. They have been furnished with all the uniforms, arms and equipments they require, and the companies are all furnished with good armories, and organized in the city, and can assemble for drill at short notice, without the expense of transportation; yet they have had but two regimental drills this year. There was no colors or colorguard, and no right or left general guide present at inspection.

The usual review to the inspecting officer was deferred, as we had no room for review or drill where they assembled on this occasion. This regiment was ordered, by Gen. Allen, to parade for drill and review, on the 10th day of October. The general was placed on the retired list, before the 10th, by order of the Commander-in Chief. The brigade staff was not ordered to appear. Your humble servant, the brigade inspector, was present, uniformed, equipped and mounted, to report the exercises prescribed by State Regulations, paragraph 532. I found Lieut. Col. Leroy in command, with large eagles on his shoulders. I did not see any company drill, but, from their appearance, should think the commanding officers of companies had performed their duty, as required by General Order No. 1, dated Headquarters, State of New York, Adjutant General's office, Albany, January 1st, 1866. Formation of the battalion, composition and march of color escort, honors paid to the colors, all have been sadly neglected. I think they have had no instruction in these exercises since the resignation of Adjutant G. G. Moore, about one year ago. His resignation was a great loss to the regiment, as he is a veteran, and served as adjutant in the 93d regiment New York State volunteers. The lessons contained in part 2d and articles 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th of part 3d, School of the Battalion, were partly gone through with. This regiment has not been reviewed during the past year by any brigade or division officer. Col. McConihe's health has not permitted him to attend the drills and parades, and the lieu一般の ない 大学 こうしゅう

tenant colonel is a resident of North Adams, Mass. A competent officer should be elected in his place. Capt. Landon, Lieut. Smith, Lieut. Thomas and Adj. Moore, all veterans, have resigned since my last annual report. Some give, as a reason for resigning, that they are disgusted with the management and discipline of the organization. Now, I would recommend that commissioned and non-commissioned officers, including field and staff, be ordered to assemble at their regimental armory, two evenings in each month during the winter, for theoretic instruction, and have some such officer as Maj. Steenburgh, Capt. Quackenbush, of company F, or Capt. Scott, of company D, appointed instructor, according to paragraph 548, General Regulations, and we will then find more veterans enlisting, and fewer resignations of competent officers.

The 72d regiment, commanded by Col. Nicholas S. Miller, in compliance with brigade orders, paraded for inspection as follows: Four companies at Wynantskill on the 28th of September, four companies at East Greenbush on the 29th, and two companies at Stephentown Flats, October 1st. Their uniforms, arms and equipments were found in good condition. The 72d paraded for drill and review in the town of East Greenbush, on the 6th of October. The brigade inspector was present—the only brigade officer on duty that day. The regiment made a good appearance; the movements were very well performed. Adjt. Davis was active in correcting errors when they occurred. The drill was a very creditable one and worthy of the regiment. The troops were reviewed by Gov. Fenton, accompanied by Col. Smith, Assistant Inspector General. At the conclusion of the review the Governor addressed the officers and men upon their duties and responsibilities, and assured them that he had done all in his power to put the National Guard on a war footing. He also complimented the officers and men for drill and general appearance.

The 97th regiment, commanded by Colonel Greenman, was inspected, and mustered three companies at Berlin, October 2d, two companies at Hoosick Falls, October 3d, and five companies at Lansingburgh, October 15th. Maj. George W. Finch has been promoted to lieutenant colonel, and Adjt. Lee Chamberlain to major; both are good officers. Company I, of this regiment, has been consolidated with other companies, and a new company has been organized in Troy under the command of Brevet Major Snyder, formerly of the 169th regiment N. Y. S. V., and attached to this

97th regiment. The 97th was reviewed by Gen. Allen and staff at Hoosic Falls on the 8th day of October.

The 30th regiment, Col. James Gibson, was ordered to parade for inspection, muster and review at the agricultural fair grounds, in the village of Salem, Washington county, on the 11th day of October. This was their first appearance in their new uniforms. The regiment looked well; their discipline was better than I ever saw it before. After the exercises of the day they marched through some of the principal streets of the village. Col. Gibson deserves great credit for the present condition of his regiment; although the companies very seldom have an opportunity to come together for drill, they will compare favorably with many city regiments. Major Reynolds and several of the line officers are veterans. This regiment should be supplied with 150 new uniforms. The Cambridge brass band, Henry Russell, leader, are attached to this regiment—a good band; their music is good and they march well.

The 111th regiment, Col. Barnes, was mustered, and inspected four companies at Middle Granville on the 22d day of October, four companies at Whitehall on the 23d. This regiment has no uniforms. The muskets, issued to this regiment, have never been distributed to the commandants of companies. The colonel having them in his possession. In regard to drill and discipline I can only refer you to last year's report.

With a few exceptions the officers of this brigade have not improved in discipline, as they ought; therefore I cannot be as complimentary as I would like. Some are not competent to execute the duties of the position they are commissioned to fill. Commandants of some companies bring their men on the ground for inspection without taking the trouble to correct irregularities in dress and equipments; and some fail to prepare the necessary rolls, as required.

A brigade and division court should be ordered, pursuant to section 250 of the Military Code, to court-martial commissioned officers.

REPORT OF BRIGADIER GENERAL J. C. SMITH, OF THE ELEVENTH BRIGADE, NATIONAL GUARD.

WM. IRVINE, Adjutant General:

General—Pursuant to paragraph 527 of General Regulations, I have the honor to transmit herewith the statements in writing subscribed by the commandants of the several regiments of my brigade, showing the particular manœuvres and exercises practiced in their regiments during the past year.

This brigade was ordered for a field day of practice, at East New York, on the 7th day of June last. The morning was devoted to the practice of the several regiments by their commandants. The afternoon was employed in the practice of the evolutions detailed on the card hereto annexed.

I had designed to have a field day with the brigade in October, and had, at the close of the parade in June, specially directed the commandants of the several regiments to prepare their several commands for the practice in the firings by battalion in brigade line of battle.

The parade of the second division in October was intended by the commandant of the division to enable the brigade to have the morning for practice in the field, but a change in the order which converted the parade to one of ceremony, for the purpose of delivering medals by the city of Brooklyn to the volunteers, prevented the carrying out of my purpose to have a field day for practice this fall.

In addition to the drills and parades of the several regiments of this brigade, which have been ordered by division, brigade and regimental orders, within their own bounds, the 47th regiment volunteered to parade with the first division in the city of New York, on the occasion of the review by His Excellency the Commander-in-chief, on the 25th of November last, and on that occasion were highly complimented for their soldierly appearance and movement in column of march.

This regiment and the 23d and 52d regiments of my command have made good progress in drill and discipline during the past year, and have materially strengthened their position in numbers as well as in efficiency.

The condition of the 56th regiment for want of uniforms has not been able to drill with the brigade, except at two officer drills which were had at the State arsenal in Brooklyn, in October last, during the past two years. The report of Colonel Adams, herewith returned, will fully explain the position of this regiment, and I have no hesitation in saying, that in future, as in the past while this regiment had its uniforms, it will be prompt to do its duty.

The howitzer battery attached to my brigade, being an independent artillery organization, is not required by the regulations to make a separate return. But it gives me great pleasure to be able to say of the howitzer battery attached to this brigade, and commanded at present by Captain Joseph S. Amore, that it is one of the most spirited commands in this division, and would, in case of active service, be found one of the most useful organizations in the National Guard of this State.

REPORT OF THE THIRTEENTH BRIGADE, NATIONAL GUARD.

Headq'rs 13th Brigade, 5th Division N. G. S. N. Y. Minaville, N. Y., October 20th, 1866.

GEN. WM. IRVINE, Adjt. Gen. S. N. Y .:

General—I have the honor to report the operations of this brigade for the past year. The regiments and companies have had frequent drills and instruction, indeed in some cases extreme, but the general average has conformed to law. The casualties would be out of place here.

The 26th regiment were paraded for inspection, &c., at Johnstown, September 10th.

The 40th regiment at Fonda, September 18th. In both these cases the weather was as unpropitious as could be, and notwith-standing the continuous heavy wet, they were held two days. The men were cheerful and happy, and, without flinching, stood well up to all their duties. The rank and file were probably not as largely represented as they would have been, except for the continuous rain which induced many to believe there would be a postponement. The sequel has proved the simple absurdity of that idea, and that in the 13th brigade there is no postponement on account of weather.

On the 8th of October the 29th regiment went into camp for four days in Camp Fenton, at Ballston Spa, and were honored with the presence of his Excellency, Governor Fenton, Inspector General Batcheller and A. A. G. Col. Stonehouse. The Governor and staff expressed surprise at the strength and efficiency of the regiment. It would therefore be out of character for me to express otherwise, if justifiable, but the officers and men are worthy of all the commendations they received. The camp was in good order and strictly arranged, as far as tenting capacities were afforded, being entirely unexpected to myself and a little more to the Colonel. His police arrangements, although strictly efficient, were not fully perfected on the early arrival of the Commander-in-Chief, and would not now be noticed, except to explain anything not strictly etiquettical to the observation of His Excellency and staff.

On the 10th of October Col. W. B. French turned out his command at Saratoga Springs for parade and inspection. Two large companies were present, of about 70 men each, the nucleus of a regiment forming in Second Assembly District, Saratoga. Officers and men being mostly veterans of service, by their neatness, effi-

ciency and soldierly bearing, set criticism at defiance, and though "a chiel's amang them tak'n notes" they need have no fears. General Batcheller being at home at the time, consented to review the troops, and being so well known to both officers and men, having served with them, it was a gratifying reunion with the General, and as pleasing to observe their pleasure, and made the most acceptable of introductions to myself.

I have sent you applications for the organization of two more companies, one with 76 applicants, both of which I hope speedily to see organized. The rolls of this regiment and these applications represent to you the élite of the citizens of Saratoga.

General, I will make no suggestions in regard to militia laws, for you have many more than are either practicable or sensible. I am satisfied of your competency to manage your own affairs. I will say I only wish the law could be let alone, at least as long as a commission lasts, that we might have an opportunity to digest what we have, and test just one time their practical effect.

On the subject of tactics, my own opinion is (with all due deference), General Morris' has not yet been excelled.

My officers and soldiers I am satisfied with and proud of.

REPORT OF THE SIXTEENTH BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 16th Brigade N. G. S. N. Y., Watertown, December, 1866.

To Brigadier General William Irvine,

Adjutant General of the State of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to submit to you the following report:
On the 6th day of August last, I issued special brigade order
No. 1, for holding an election for the choice of major in the 36th
regiment, that office being vacant. The election was held on the
25th day of August, as per order, at which I presided, and Edward
S. Salisbury, 2d, was duly elected to fill said vacancy, and has
been duly commissioned.

On the 13th day of August I issued special order No. 2, for the election of colonel in the 87th regiment, which office had become

vacant by the resignation of Colonel Moses M. Smith. Said election was held on the 1st day of September, at which I presided also. Lieutenant Colonel Edward B. Livingston was promoted to the office of colonel, Major Samuel F. Garmon was promoted to the office of lieutenant colonel, and Adjutant George D. Brown was promoted to the office of major, all of whom have been duly commissioned.

On the 24th day of September I issued general order No. 1, a copy of which is herewith transmitted and marked "A," by which the several regiments composing this brigade were ordered to "rendezvous for muster, inspection and review," at the different times and places mentioned in said order. This order was published in daily and weekly editions of the New York Reformer, and promulgated by serving a copy thereof on the commandants of the several regiments, and transmitting a copy to the Inspector General, together with a recommendation that Colonel L. F. Lyttle, division inspector, be detailed to inspect the brigade, there being no brigade inspector. On the 17th of October, and after a part of the inspections had been made by others, as reported, I received notice from the inspector general's office, dated October 15, that Colonel Lyttle had been detailed for that service as requested.

Three of the regiments, the 36th, 94th and 87th, responded to the order, all duly officered—officers in full uniform, armed and equipped as required by law and regulations.

Special mention is due to the 36th regiment for the promptness and efficiency of its officers of the field and companies. This regiment was inspected by Colonel William D. Ferguson, of Oswego county, detailed by me for that service.

The 94th regiment responded, with the exception of company B, Captain Byron Fox commanding. Officers were uniformed, armed and equipped; all exhibiting commendable zeal in their several departments of service. This regiment was inspected by me, and returns of such inspection have been forwarded to the inspector general.

The 87th mustered its full quota of companies; officers and men uniformed, armed and equipped as the law and regulations require; and in numbers exceeded either of the other regiments. Field, company and staff officers, are entitled to special commendation for their persevering efforts to meet the requirements of our military code, in which they have proved themselves eminently suc-

cessful. Division Inspector, Colonel L. F. Lyttle, inspected this regiment.

The order for the 35th regiment to rendezvous by battalion (see order) was responded to by Captain Balme, Co. F; Captain Tillinghast, Co. H; Captain Hopkins, Co. K, and Major Caleb Henderson, the only representative of the field or staff on inspection. These companies were inspected by me, and returns made. No returns of field and staff officers in this regiment have been made to me.

There are seven companies in this regiment above the minimum in numbers, at the last annual report, that are in possession of uniforms, arms and equipage. The prime causes of this remissness on the part of this regiment consist, first, in the wanton violation of section 121 of the military code of this State, by the board of supervisors of Jefferson county, in not admitting that the "rent of a room or building, to be used for the purposes of such armory, shall be a county charge," and their utter contempt for that portion of said section which declares that such rent "shall be paid by such supervisors;" application for such rent having been made to them, at their last and previous sessions, by commandants of companies, after having obtained "the approval of the inspector general;" and no action thereon has been taken by said board, notwithstanding the rent had been paid by the captains themselves in good faith.

Second. The neglect and refusal of the supervisors, prior to their session in November last, to levy the tax imposed by section 14 of the Laws of 1862, after copies of the enrollment had been filed with the county clerk and with the Adjutant General, as required by section 13 of said law.

Third. No brigade or regimental courts martial have been appointed or held for the trial of delinquent officers or men since the organization of the brigade, until the present year, consequently the requirements of law have been treated with contempt.

These and other barriers to the prosperity of the "National Guard," in Jefferson county, have been removed by the law abiding board of supervisors of Lewis county, the home of the 87th, and the result is nowhere more apparent than on the field for inspection and review. The people of Lewis county are entitled to credit for selecting from their number men to serve them as supervisors who regard law as the basis for their action, and have

sufficient regard for the public weal to aid, by their local legislation, in the sustainment of a "well-organized militia."

REPORT OF THE EIGHTEENTH BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Office of the Brigade Inspector, 18th Brigade N. G. S. N. Y., Walton, October 15th, 1866.

To Brig. Gen. WILLIAM IRVINE, Adjutant Gen. S. N. Y.:

Sir—I have the honor to enclose, herewith, the annual inspection return of this brigade, and also my report of the general condition of this command as shown by this fall's reviews and inspections.

The 27th regiment, commanded by Col. James Oliver, and the 100th, commanded by Col. Williams Martin, were ordered by Gen. Danforth to encamp at Delhi, on the 10th of September. The regiments were promptly on the ground by 4 P. M., and at once proceeded to pitch their tents and arrange the details of the camp, the men entering at once into the spirit which the new order of things had awakened. The tents were furnished by the State, and the straw and other necessaries of the camp by the officers and citizens of Delhi.

The camp was governed by the discipline and regulations of the United States army.

[Assem. No. 242.]

The actual knowledge gained and the advancement made, both by officers and privates, was more and more marked each day, demonstrating beyond a question, that the advantages to be gained from an encampment are far superior to those derived from the usual two day's parade and review. Some of the companies rationed themselves upon the grounds, bringing their cooking utensils with them, and the cost of subsistence per man for the entire five days, did not exceed two dollars and fifty cents.

I would respectfully suggest that some effort be made, either to pay or subsist the men while upon duty.

In the rural districts, where two-thirds of the members of the National Guard have to support their families by their daily labor, it is a heavy tax upon them to attend an encampment of three or five days, and be obliged to furnish their own rations and pay their traveling expenses, and if they should raise the question of pecuniary gain, it would be better for them to remain at home and pay the fine which the law imposes.

The two regiments were reviewed by Gen. Danforth and staff, on Thursday the 13th of September, and by Maj. Gen. Burnside and staff, on Friday the 14th of September. The reviews of each regiment, upon both of these occasions, were excellent; the marching and wheelings would have done credit to any regiment which had seen service in the field, and as after the review, they marched through the streets of Delhi, the soldierly bearing and excellent behavior of the officers and privates, gave evidence that the material was there, which would require but a few months of strict discipline to develop it into regiments equal to any in our regular army.

The arms, equipments and uniforms of both regiments were in fine condition, especially those of the 27th, and a disposition was manifested by all company commandants to account correctly for all State property committed to their care.

The 108th was inspected on the 24th and 25th of September, and reviewed by Gen. Danforth and staff on the afternoon of the 25th. This regiment has been somewhat demoralized since the last parade, but under the influence of the recently elected Col. A. Furgerson, (a gentleman of ability and high standing in society, and who has served with much credit and honor in the same position in our volunteer army during the late war,) it is gaining fast the ground lost, and should the improvement continue until next fall, will equal any in the brigade. The Colonel and his staff

have already gained the good will and confidence of all subordinate officers. This is essential to the success of any organization of this kind.

The arms and equipments were in fair condition; uniforms fine. The 83d regiment was ordered out for review and inspection October 1st, and was reviewed by Gen. Danforth and staff, Tuesday, October 2d. The inspection was made Monday and Tuesday. October 1st and 2d. The regiment presented much the same appearance as at the last review, very little progress having been made either by officers or privates. The same trouble exists now as last year, a deficiency in knowledge of the tactics among nearly all the commanding officers.

The arms, equipments and uniforms were in fair condition.

REPORT OF THE NINETEENTH BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 19th Brigade, N. G. S. N. Y. \ Peterboro, November 24th, 1866.

Brig. Genl. Wm. Irvine, Adjt. Genl. S. N. Y .:

GENERAL—In pursuance of law and regulations, I have the honor to submit this, my annual report of the 19th Brigade, N. G.

S. N. Y. Said brigade is composed of five regimental districts, viz.: 42, 43, 76, 103 and 105. In pursuance of General Order No. 1, the officers and non-commissioned officers of the brigade, and the regimental bands of the 42d and 103d regiments paraded for officer drill at Sherburne, Chenango county, on the 20th, 21st and 22d days of August, 1866. The parade was well attended; there were over five hundred in line, armed, uniformed and equipped, according to regulations. The drill commenced with the school of the soldier; all field, line and staff officers were drilled in the manual of arms, &c., by being divided into squads. Each squad was commanded by efficient officers, under my supervision. The parade was one of the finest military displays I ever witnessed. The regiments have all been inspected and reviewed, as will be seen by the Brigade Inspector's returns.

The 42d regiment paraded at Morrisville, October 1st, 2d and 3d, for drill inspection and review. The weather was fine. This was the first parade of the 42d as a regiment, under its present organization; the time was well spent in organizing and drilling the officers and men. The parade proved to a certainty that all that is wanting to make the N. G. all that is desired, is that officers and men devote their time. It is my opinion that it would be far better to hold all the parades by regiment or brigade, and that all the parades for the year be held at one time; say by brigade, six consecutive days in each year, and dispense with the company parades. The company parades in the rural districts are of no benefit to the organization, as there is no uniformity in the company drills of the companies in the same regiments. The improvements in drill, in the 19th brigade, has been all that could be expected; the 42d regiment is one of the best drilled regiments, of its age, that I ever have had the pleasure of reviewing; their march and wheelings in review, gave them the appearance of veteran troops, more than of N. G.'s of but two years' existence.

REPORT OF THE TWENTIETH BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 20th Brigade N. G. S. N. Y. Corning, November 20th, 1866.

Brig. Gen. Wm. Irvine, Adjt. Gen. S. N. Y .:

General—In compliance with general regulations, I have the honor to make the annual report of the 20th brigade, consisting of the 60th, 104th and 106th Regiments Infantry N. G. S. N. Y.

The 60th regiment, Col. S. M. Alley of Hornellsville, commanding, has 10 company organizations, all of which are partially uniformed with the altered United States uniform, and armed with the Springfield rifled muskets. Col. Alley has been connected with this regiment for several years, and labored under many disadvantages. He has but little military experience, but has considerable energy. This, together with the tactical knowledge of Lieut. Col. Geo. E. Gray, (who is a good drill officer), should make this a first class regiment. They have 400 uniforms and guns.

The 104th regiment, Col. C. A. Canfield of Bath, commanding, is a fine regiment, composed of nine company organizations, six partially uniformed with the New York State uniform, and armed with the Springfield rifled musket. With a fair show, this regiment could be made an ornament to the National Guard.

Col. Canfield is one of the best of officers, and has labored hard to organize and discipline his regiment, but owing to the fact, that he has been unable to procure a sufficient number of uniforms, it has been impossible for him to make the appearance he otherwise would. There are at this time 100 men, mostly returned veterans, ready to join this regiment in addition to those already enrolled, if uniforms could be procured. They have now 300 uniforms and 400 guns.

The 106th regiment, Col. C. H. Thomson of Corning, commanding, is composed mostly of returned veterans, and has 10 company organizations, each having 40 of the New York State uniforms, and 40 Springfield rifled muskets. This regiment can easily parade 800 men as soon as uniforms can be procured. Col. Thomson has but little military experience, but is a man of great perseverance. This, united with the tactical knowledge of his field and line officers, most of whom are old soldiers, I think will accomplish his desire to make it one of the best regiments in the State, outside the cities.

In accordance with brigade orders, the annual review and inspection was had by regiment. The 60th regiment at Hornellsville, on the 22d of September, owing to the rainy weather and bad roads, the regiment was not fully represented, but such as were present, about 200 men, made a good appearance, and were manœuvred by Lieut. Col. Gray in a soldierly manner. They were inspected by Major B. Bennitt, inspector of this brigade.

The 106th, at Corning, on the 28th of September, was a fine display, the regiment having just received their new uniforms, and wearing them for the first time. They mustered 498 men, and paraded every uniform. They were reviewed by Inspector General Batcheller, who expressed himself much pleased with the appearance and discipline of the regiment. They were inspected by Major Baker.

The 104th at Bath, on the 17th day of October, were paraded and manœuvred by Col. Canfield with much ability, and made a fine appearance, particularly in marching in review. They were inspected by Major Bennitt. Lieut. Col. Higgins of the Inspector General's department was present.

In conclusion, I would most respectfully recommend that this brigade be ordered on camp duty sometime during the coming year, as the most effectual way of perfecting the men in the duties of the soldier. Owing to the distance to travel and the difficulty of getting the command together, it is almost impossible for them to drill as companies, much less as regiments or brigade, but by going into camp, say for one week, the regiments could be paraded to the full extent of the uniforms on hand. The officers would take more interest in the matter, and I believe it would be for the benefit of the service.

General—Pursuant to General Regulations, I have the honor to report the 20th brigade, consisting of the 60th, 104th and 106th regiments.

The annual inspection and review of the 60th regiment took place at Hornelsville, September 22d, 1866, Lieutenant Colonel George Grey, commanding. Eight companies were in line, and were reviewed by Brig. Gen. J. H. Lansing, accompanied by his staff, and presented a good appearance, although the inspection and review took place under very unfavorable circumstances.

The annual inspection and review of the 106th regiment, took place at Corning, September 28th, Colonel C. H. Thomson, commanding; ten companies were in line. This regiment was reviewed by Brigadier General George S. Batcheller, accompanied by Lieutenant Colonel Higgins, and Brigadier General J. H. Lansing, and his staff. Of the fine soldierly bearing of the officers and men of this regiment, I cannot speak too highly.

The energy displayed by Colonel Thompson, in organising and drilling his regiment, is worthy of high commendation. And the proficiency attained by the officers and men is worthy of imitation of others. From this regiment I have a full account of the property and arms delivered to them and in their keeping. The regiment has but four hundred uniforms, and the same number of stand of arms and equipments.

I recommend that 400 additional stand of arms, equipments and uniforms be issued to Colonel Thompson, as he has now enlisted nearly enough men to require them. If he had the uniforms and arms, he would soon have one of the best regiments in the State.

The annual inspection and review of the 104th regiment, Col. C. A. Canfield, commanding, took place at Bath, October 17th. Eight companies were present, six only in uniform. Companies H, and G, having recently been consolidated, were not present as an organized body. Companies "F" and "I" not having yet received their uniforms or arms although present for inspection. The companies that are armed and in uniform, are fully equal in drill and military appearance to any in the brigade. Colonel Canfield is a thorough tactician, and if he had sufficient uniforms and arms, he has the material for a first rate regiment.

Company "D" Captain Philip Conrad of the 60th regiment, appeared at Bath, in pursuance of orders for inspection; three officers and fifteen men answered to their names. This company is of the town of Wayland, and so remote from the place of general rendezvous of the 60th, as to be a great inconvenience for the men to assemble there. I therefore recommend, that the town of Wayland be taken from the 60th, and added to the 104th regimental district.

The 104th regiment was reviewed by Brigadier General J. H. Lansing, accompanied by his staff. Lieutenant Colonel Higgins, Assistant Inspector General, was present a part of the day, and from him I received valuable instruction, concerning the inspection of the regiment.

I enclose herewith the annual muster and inspection rolls of all the companies of this brigade, except company "I," Capt. Franklin Wheeler of the 104th regiment, by which it appears that there were present at the annual inspection of officers and men as follows:

There is an armory situate at Corning, with considerable property of the State deposited there. I made inquiries with the view of inspecting the property and reporting thereon, but was informed that neither armory or property is in charge of or under the control of any one in this brigade.

REPORT OF THE TWENTY-SECOND BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 22d Brigade N. G. S. N. Y., Newburgh, December 1st, 1866.

Brigadier General WILLIAM IRVINE:

General—In compliance with general regulation, I have the honor to make the annual report of the 22d brigade, consisting of the 19th and 91st regiments, located in Orange county, and of the 92d regiment, located in Sullivan county.

The 19th regiment is an old organization—has served in the service of the United States one year and five months, is fully organized, but without uniforms—they having been worn out, and no arms, excepting some of the old fashioned altered muskets. The inspection of last year was very satisfactory; the present not so well, from the fact that the members of it are somewhat discouraged in being disappointed in not receiving new arms and uniforms. I hope the Legislature will act justly towards the military organization of the State, and that this excellent regiment will soon receive all that is necessary to insure its completeness.

The 91st regiment is a new organization, having made its first regimental parade in October, 1865. It is now commanded by Col. John D. Wood, formerly of the 19th regiment, an officer of experience and efficiency. It has the material and district to make it a good one.

The 92d regiment is also a new organization, making its first parade in October, 1865. It will make a good regiment, but needs encouragement. Its parades and drills are attended with great trouble, time and expense, being scattered over the expanse of the large county of Sullivan; the nearest company to its county seat, Monticello, being twelve miles; the other companies are from twenty to forty miles distant. While drilling this regiment, and during the muster, inspection and review, I witnessed much of hardship and privation on the part of the men, and, consequently, much of discontent, from having to travel so far, taking much of time and expense, and receiving therefor no compensation.

I think, in view of the above statement, which applies, more or less, to all organizations in the State, as a matter of right and justice, some provision should be made for paying the men for at least the number of days they are ordered by competent authority to attend drills, &c. The object of all military drills is for the purpose of making the organization efficient, and, therefore, available for service in time of need; and, as such efficiency and availability, in the volunteer or regular service, was not consummated, without being paid for, I think it but just, and right, that the members of any company or regiment are entitled to a just remuneration for the time taken, to make them efficient in the time of need, as much so as for any other service rendered, upon

the simple principle that "the laborer," of whatever degree, "is worthy of his hire."

On the 13th and 14th days of September, I held a meeting of the field officers and brigade staff officers for theoretic instruction; and, on the 4th and 5th days of October, I had a drill of the officers and non-commissioned officers of the brigade, in pursuance of paragraph 151 of the Military Code of the State, at which they were instructed and drilled, irrespective of rank, in the school of the soldier, company and battalion.

The inspection of the 19th regiment, owing to its members having no uniforms, was ordered to be made by companies at their respective armories.

The 91st regiment paraded in Middletown on the 11th and 12th days of October; was thoroughly drilled by me in the course of instruction, prescribed by order of the Commander-in-Chief, and in most of the other movements of the school of the battalion, and were inspected during the parade.

The 92d regiment paraded in Monticello, Sullivan county, on the 17th and 18th days of October, and was thoroughly and ably drilled by Brevet Colonel William D. Dickey, N. Y. Vols., now lieutenant colonel of the 19th regiment, under my supervision, at which the course of annual instruction and most of the evolutions in the tactics were performed. The manner in which the movements were executed elicited my highest approval. This regiment was reviewed by myself and staff, on the last day of the parade, as was also the muster and inspection concluded.

In conclusion, I would respectfully suggest that it would be very desirable, on the part of my command, to have a division or brigade encampment, as provided by law, which would give both officers and men a better idea of and practice of their duties, especially to those regiments situated in the sparse settled sections of the country, where it is so difficult for companies, so scattered, to get together.

REPORT OF THE TWENTY-FOURTH BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 24th Brigade N. G. Syracuse, Nov. 30, 1866.

To Brig. Gen. Wm. IRVINE,

Adjutant General State of N. Y.:

Sir—I have the honor to make the following report. On the 29th January, General Orders No. 3, of last year, ordering company drills, was by special order revoked as to the 48th regiment, so as to require weekly drills thereafter upon order of the colonel of that regiment only.

On the first day of May, of the present year, general orders No. 1 issued from the headquarters, requiring, in addition to the exercise prescribed by General Regulations, the course of instructions prescribed by order of the Commander-in-chief through your department.

On the 21st day of May, general orders No. 2 from these headquarters ordered company drills on the last Saturday of each month, until further orders, to commence at 2 o'clock, P. M., each day, and continue four hours: and further ordered, that all companies which appeared on drill with a less number of men than forty, be required to drill once each week thereafter until further orders. At these drills injections of arms, accourrements and uniforms of each company were made according to orders, and reported through commandants of regiments to these headquarters, within ten days after each of said drills. Regimental parades and drills were also held pursuant to the appointment thereof by said order No. 2, except that the place of drill and parade, named for the 85th regiment therein, was by special order changed from Onondaga Hill to Onondaga Valley. In pursuance of general orders No. 3 from these headquarters, an inspection, drill and review of the forces comprising the 24th brigade took place on the 27th, 28th and 29th days of August last, at Messina Springs on the same grounds used for that purpose last year. The troops provided themselves with three days' rations, assembled at the armory in this city at 8 o'clock, A. M. on the 27th, were transported by rail to the vicinage of the camp, except the artillery and cavalry, who marched thither; and all encamped the same evening on the field in tents provided for that purpose from the Quartermaster General's department. The transportation of

troops and supplies was well done by Lieut. Col. E. C. Fellows, of the 51st regiment, specially detailed to that duty.

In order to evoke a proper spirit of emulation among the several companies and regiments comprising the brigade, and to promote the interests and welfare of this command, the General commanding caused to be prepared and offered, as a prize, a stand of State colors to the regiment that should be found to excel all others at this encampment, in the number of men present, in preficiency in drill, in discipline and deportment, and soldierly condition of arms and accourrements—the award to be made by the Inspector General, or, in case of his absence, by other impartial judges. Major A. G. Cook, Brigade Inspector, for the like purpose, also offered as a prize to the best drilled company, a silver medal. On or about the 20th day of August, invitations to witness the drill, and review the command, were forwarded to the Commander-in-chief and staff, to the Lieut. Governor, the Major General commanding the division, to the Mayor of Syracuse, and other distinguished gentlemen.

To the brigade staff, consisting of the following officers, acknowledgments are due for valuable service in promoting the success of the encampment: Major E. L. Walrath, Engineer and A. A. A. G., Major A. G. Cook, Brigade Inspector, Major John C. Hunt, Captain P. P. Midler, Captain S. W. Sherlock, Captain A. C. Yates and Captain James S. Leach, assisted by three volunteer Aids, constituted the staff on this occasion. Peculiar credit is due to Major E. L. Walrath and Major A. G. Cook, both of whom had seen much active and honorable service in the field of actual war. Too much credit cannot be awarded to the commandants of regiments and companies, for the general proficiency in drill and discipline exhibited on the occasion; and on another similar occasion it is hoped that all will rival the best regiments and companies now.

The regulations for the camp contained in general order No. 4, were substantially adhered to throughout the encampment. Adjutant General William Irvine, Quartermaster General Edwin S. Merritt, Colonel Bradley Martin, Aid-de-camp, with Lieut. Colonel Higgins, Assistant Inspector General, having arrived at the Globe Hotel, from the Commander-in-chief's headquarters, were attended by proper escort to the camp, and there inspected and reviewed the forces.

The companies in two regiments only, the 48th and 51st, com-

peted for the silver medal; and Colonel Miles, commanding 75th, Colonel Bennett, commanding 85th, and Lieut. Colonel Alvord, commanding the 88th regiment, acting as a committee to award the prize medal, awarded the same to company "A" of the 51st regiment, for superior proficiency in drill. Brigadier General Irvine awarded the stand of colors to the 48th regiment, Colonel Timothy Sullivan commanding, for superiority of drill and discipline, awarding at the same time great praise to the 51st and 85th regiments. For the strength of the forces comprising the brigade, you are respectfully referred to the new muster-rolls filed in your department by the Brigade Inspector, Major A. G. Cook.

It is further respectfully submitted, that for practice and perfection in battalion and brigade drill and field evolutions, brigade encampments are very necessary. But a three days' encampment, in addition to battalion and company drills, is a heavy tax on the time and purse of the citizen soldier, especially in the rural districts, where he is obliged to move a long distance from his home, and, in addition to losing his time, has to furnish himself with food at his own charge. It is therefore respectfully suggested that a moderate per diem compensation and rations to the soldier while on duty under orders, be allowed them by law.

It is believed that such a provision would add largely to the muster-rolls of the regiments everywhere, and to the fullness of attendance on all occasions, and stimulate the spirit of emulation, especially among the poorer privates already enrolled, and among other classes of the community who are not, but ought to be there.

REPORT OF THE TWENTY-FIFTH BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 25th Brigade, (7th Division N. G. S. N. Y.)

General—I herewith transmit the returns of the several commands in this brigade, as far as I have been able to obtain them. I would respectfully represent, that the inspector of this brigade has labored under many disadvantages this year, owing to the negligence of company commanders, and in some instances commandants of regiments.

General Williams and staff were present at the review of the 54th and 107th regiments and the battalion of artillery, and the inspector general of the State was present at review, muster and inspection of the 107th and 59th regiments.

REPORT OF THE TWENTY-EIGHTH BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

ITHACA, November 14th, 1866.

Brig. Gen. Wm. IRVINE, Adj. Gen. S. N. Y.:

General—As inspector of the 28th brigade N. G., I have the honor to report: That the three regiments composing this brigade were, by Colonel H. D. Barto, commanding brigade, ordered to parade for inspection—the 50th at Ithaca, October 16th; the 110th at Elmira, October 17th, and the 44th at Binghamton, October 18th, 1866.

The 50th paraded 10 companies under the command of Lieut. Col. Charles F. Blood, and made a very creditable appearance. This regiment is fully uniformed, armed and equipped. The arms and uniforms were in good order. Two or three of the companies have no suitable place where the arms can be properly cared for, the supervisors of their respective towns refusing to furnish them with an armory. The regiment has never been exercised in field manœuvres, and has not paraded or drilled as a regiment since the last annual inspection. The officers and non-commissioned officers were drilled two consecutive days in the school of the soldier and company by the brigade inspector, assisted by Lieut. Col. Blood,

and made considerable proficiency, and its effects were seen at this inspection, in a manifest improvement in company movements, from that of last inspection. By the promotion of Colonel H. D. Barto to the command of the brigade, the command of the regiment devolves upon Lieut. Col. Charles F. Blood, who is a good drill officer and understands his duties, and I have no doubt the regiment will advance in discipline and efficiency under his command.

In compliance with orders, I proceeded to Elmira, on the 17th October, to inspect the 110th regiment, Colonel S. F. Arnot. After considerable trouble, I succeeded in finding Colonel Arnot, who stated that he had directed the lieutenant colonel to issue the orders for the inspection, but he had neglected to issue them, and he (Col. Arnot) had been so busy with politics that he had paid no further attention to it, and had forgotten that that was the day for the inspection. He, however, promised to order the regiment to parade for inspection at Horse Heads, on the 26th of October, and I left him with that distinct understanding. I accordingly proceeded to Horse Heads on the 26th October, but found no troops to inspect, nor any one that could give me any information as to whether the parade had been ordered. I accordingly went to Elmira in search of Colonel Arnot, in order to find out why the parade had not been ordered, but he was absent from town, and I have heard nothing further from him or his regiment.

On the 18th October I went to Binghamton for the purpose of inspecting the 44th regiment. The colonel, W. G. Dunn, informed me that he had but lately been appointed to the command of the regiment; that no books or papers had been turned over to him, whereby he could ascertain the state of the command; that he could find no commandants of companies that would acknowledge that they had or could parade any men; that the understanding among the men composing the companies was, that the companies were disbanded, and finding things in this state, he thought it best not to order a parade, and consequently there was no inspection.

Colonel Dunn (who was in active service all through the late war, and who appears to be qualified for the position to which he has been appointed) is endeavoring to get up new company organizations throughout the county, and those to whom he has given authorization papers to raise companies are mostly those who have been in active service; but I do not think they will

succeed, as the minimum number (64) is entirely too large to be raised by volunteering, especially in the country districts. No enrollment was made in this county (Broome) the last year, as required by law.

REPORT OF THE THIRTY-SECOND BRIGADE NATIONAL GUARD.

Office of Brigade Inspector of 32d Brig. 8th Div. N. G. S. N. Y., Buffalo, November 24, 1866.

To Brig. Gen. WILLIAM IRVINE:

General—I have the honor to report, that on the 10th and 11th days of September, I drilled, mustered and inspected the 67th regiment, Colonel Chauncey Abbott, commanding, at Springville. That in despite of no encouragement during the past year having been given the organization in either arms, equipments or uniforms, the regiment turned out in good numbers in the instance of most companies, and learned exceedingly well while under instruction. The Colonel commanding did not distribute the blanks of muster rolls to company commandants until it was too late to make them out, consequently, my returns and this report were delayed until this late day, I having been compelled to take data only with which to compare the rolls as sent in, and in one instance, the company commander has not yet sent in his roll. At Warsaw, on the 13th and 14th days of the same month, I drilled the 61st regiment, Colonel Jabez Warren, commanding, and found a more pleasing state of affairs; one-half the companies appearing in uniform, and all showing that they retained the instructions received at the encampment of 1865. At same place, and learning readily, so that on the second day preceding inspection and muster, a review of the regiment by Brigadier General Aaron Riley, passed off in a most creditable manner, the regiment presenting a fine military appearance, and passing in review most admirably. Gen. Riley and staff came upon the ground mounted and equipped in such a

manner, as to indicate a zeal in the interests of the brigade, and the performance of their duties with it. This organization seems determined to persevere, until the organization shall exist in more than a name, and I predict, will another year, present as fine an appearance as any battalion in the State. No better material can be found than it is composed of. Both regiments of the brigade are located in regions that can be better reached by these organizations, than any other that could be made, and that are peculiarly well calculated to maintain first class regiments, if anything is done for them.

REPORT OF FIRST BRIGADE CAVALRY NATIONAL GUARD.

Headquarters 1st Brigade Cavalry N. G. S. N. Y., New York, Nov. 14, 1866.

To Brigadier General Wm. IRVINE,

Adjutant General of the State of New York:

General—I herewith transmit the inspection returns of the first brigade of cavalry commanded by Brigadier General Brooke Postley, consisting of the first regiment of cavalry, commanded by Col. D. C. Minton, and the third regiment of cavalry, commanded by Col. John H. Budke.

The delay in receiving uniforms for the recruits of the third regiment caused a postponement of the inspection from the 25th to the 30th of October, on which latter day a severe rain storm prevailing, the third regiment was marched to its armory, and there inspected by company.

The cavalry have hitherto been laboring under great disadvantage in regard to uniforms from the State, when the Commander-

in-Chief, in justice and kindness, ordered the third regiment to be furnished with uniforms and horse equipments. Part of the uniforms have been received, as will be seen by the muster rolls.

This regiment is under strict discipline, and is officered by young and active men.

Since the adoption of General St. George Cook's tactics, there has been regular theoretical drills of the officers, and also regular company drills.

There is no doubt, if it is speedily furnished with horse equipments and necessary arms, it will be the best cavalry regiment in the National Guard, both in material and discipline.

I have inspected the company roll and order books, according to brigade orders, and found they corresponded with the musterroll and inspection returns. The order books are properly written up.

The regiment has an armory which is in good order, and the State property deposited there well taken care of.

The brigade staff was inspected at brigade headquarters, and made a fine appearance. Their horse equipments exceed any I have seen in the first division.

The first regiment of cavalry was inspected within the third regiment armory by company, on the 31st of October.

The First regiment has been in want of uniforms and horse equipments until last summer, when the Commander-in-chief ordered it to be furnished with uniforms and horse equipments. Part of them have been received, as will be seen by the muster-rolls.

This regiment has no armory.

I have inspected the company roll and order books, according to brigade orders, and found the order books properly written up.

I reluctantly report that all my official intercourse with the colonel of the first regiment convinces me that he is a very improper person to command a regiment.
