Dear Mother

Your very kind letter of the 5th & 6th was received last evening and I can assure you that I was happy to hear from you. I am glad you are enjoying good health. I received a letter from Corneille yesterday and I immediately answered it. You stated that you had not presented that order to Mr. Ripple. — You had better preserve the order and when ever you need money, you can present it to him and get it. — I sent you thirty Dollars

by express nearly two weeks ago.
You will please write and
let me know whether you re-
ceive it — I hope that my
Grandfather will have good
luck in moving — If he can
get a good Snyer bush so time
upon reasonable terms I think
he had better take it — for Harry
is getting large enough so that he
can do considerable of the work
and ~~it~~ if it is a good season
for making Snyer she will make
more than enough for his own
use which is an important item.

Oliver is getting such large
