

From the Commander:

Welcome Aboard...Again!

Greetings, and welcome to 2023. I know that this title ("Welcome Aboard...Again") will have many of you raising your eyebrows. What does "again" mean? Over the years, I've had the good fortune of welcoming so many new members into our organization. Reservists from the Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, from Montauk Point to Alexandria Bay and Niagara Falls have pledged their time and abilities to support our missions. And then they return to their Reserve units and their daily lives, seldom becoming involved on any of our active missions or programs.

Much of this is on us. There are many times

when we do not have State Active Duty (SAD) orders that are available for the taking. However that is certainly not the case right now. As of today (December 2022), we have about 96 NYNM members on Asylum Seeker mission orders and about 36 members on Enduring Covid Support mission orders. The members staffing these billets are not sitting in an office waiting for something to do. They are "handson" in facilities working with people and equipment to respond to rapidly evolving conditions. And while immediate orders may not be available on a daily basis, we certainly welcome you to contact our HQ office and let them know of your availability.

Besides volunteering to serve on SAD orders, there is another way that you can be of service and play an integral role in our day-to-day operations. WE NEED LEADERS to run our organization and provide direction continuity inside all our Reserve Centers and facilities as well as our senior staff. This is critical. It's also important to realize that "senior" does not mean you have to be a Captain or Colonel to step up. We need leaders at all levels, from mid-grade enlisted to those at the O-3 and O-4 point in their careers. We have immediate openings at several important staff billets, as well as liaison and coordinator positions inside Reserve facilities. Most of these positions require only small commitments of time yet make a big difference to how our NYNM functions on a daily basis.

Additionally, if you would like to hear more about these available positions, or you would like to participate in our planning cycle, I'd welcome you to join us in one of our quarterly Leadership Conferences, which are held in Latham. These are valuable because not only you will get to see what happens "behind the scene," but you will get to meet the other leaders who make us function successfully across the state.

So once again, I'd like to say "welcome aboard," and I look forward to seeing more of

you in the coming year.

Deputy Commander News:

The next promotion cycle is less than six months away. Soon we will be forwarding to Regional Commanders and Senior Enlisted Advisors the names of members that are potentially eligible for promotion in the 2023 NYNM Promotion cycle.

You must submit a Promotion Application in accordance with New York Naval Militia instruction 1410.1D to be reviewed for promotion.

The 2019 checklist located on our website provides a simple guide to follow to ensure all your documents are included in your application.

A Walkthrough for the applications package follows:

- 1. Recommendation for Promotion: This is from your Regional Commander or your MEBS Commander.
- 2. Narrative Justification: This is a letter from you to the Board President
- 3. Minimum time in grade: From the instruction (usually 3 years)
- 4. Recent Photo: this shows you in Working or Dress Uniform. Show the Board you have good Military Bearing
- 5. Current Fitness Report: Probably written by your Commander (can be more than 1 year)
- 6. Minimum of Five years of Fitness Reports or Evaluations: If you have Reserve

evaluations within 5 years include those (Do Not send more than 5 years)

- 7. Current medical exam on file: Check with NYNM HQ
- 8. Civilian Skills Questionnaire: From the web site fill out a new one to ensure your current skills are represented to the Board.
- 9. Individual Training Record: This Form is no longer used HOWEVER Write to explain to the Board what you have done in recent years to support the Naval Militia
- 10.Billet Description: Explain what you do now and what you expect to do when promoted
- 11.DD-214's: contact HQ to ensure we have your DD-214s
- 12. Meets Grooming standards: this check in the box is from your photo submitted above
- 13.NYNM application on file: contact HQ to ensure we have your application
- 14.Age less than 68: this check in the box is taken care of by HQ

15.Unique to OPERATION COVID 19/Enduring COVID/Asylum Support: many members have supported these missions this past year. A letter of recommendation by an Officer or Senior Enlisted member in your State Active-Duty chain-of-command supporting your State Active Duty work can be helpful —THIS DOES NOT REPLACE A RECOMMENDATION BY A NAVAL MILITIA OFFICER.

(Do not submit extra "I love Me" stuff. However, A photo of you on State Active Duty is good and copies of additional FEMA (or rate related) course training certificates are acceptable)

The New York Naval Militia is fortunate to have dedicated men and women that give up their time in the service of New York State. As we know the opportunities for accolades, rewards, and pay are few and far between. However, for those members that are no longer part of the Drilling Reserves there is still a measure of recognition and appreciation: Promotion.

The referenced instruction provides the guidance on submitting a promotion package to Headquarters. The Promotion Board will meet after 1 JUN 23 this year. Please have complete promotion packages submitted by 30 May 2023, to the "President, 2023 Promotion Board c/o CAPT David Hawley, Deputy Commander, NYNM, DMNA, 330 Niskayuna Rd., Latham, NY 12110." If you believe that you are eligible for promotion you are encouraged to submit your application. The first duty of the Promotion Board is to verify eligibility.

Applications for Promotion should be sent via US mail, email with .gov or .mil addresses, or by FAX. (you may also drop off the application to the NYNM Office) Do not send your SSN or private personal identifying information (PII) by email.

A very important First Step in any promotion package is a letter of recommendation from your reporting senior. In most cases this will be your Regional Commander. This is in addition to a current evaluation or fitness report. Fitness reports and Evaluations for NYNM members may encompass more than one year.

I cannot stress enough to talk to your Regional Commander and/or Senior Enlisted Leader about what you can do to improve your promotion application.

It is extremely important that members that wish to be considered for promotion provide a complete promotion package. Nothing provides the promotion board with a better "first impression" than a complete and well organized promotion application.

Applications for promotion to E7, E8 and E9 must be reviewed by the Command Senior Enlisted Advisors before the Board reviews your application. Contact our Command Senior Enlisted Advisors: Master Chief Niemitalo and MGySgt Rignola for guidance.

Key on last year's Promotion Board was the question:

"What has this individual done for the New York Naval Militia lately?"

If you cannot answer that for yourself then contact your Regional Commander to get involved. The answer is not: "Once I get promoted I'll do lots of great things."

If your NYNM activities in the past year are not obvious then explain what you have done in the past year in your letter to the Board President.

The Promotion Board looks at what have you done for the Naval Militia and what can you do in the future.

What is the Admiral Josephthal Award?

Every Year the Commander of the New York Naval Militia awards the Josephthal Award to a Militia Person of the year and a Militia Unit of the Year. The 2023 Award Nominations can be provided anytime before June 1st, 2023, to the Commander. New York Naval Militia, C/O Naval Militia Headquarters, 330 Old Niskayuna Rd, Latham NY 12110.

Admiral Louis M. Josephthal was the Commander of the New York Naval Militia from 1925 to 1929. In his last Will and Testament he left a sum of money to New York state to "be devoted annually for a trophy for the Naval Militia fthe State of New York to be known as the Josephthal Trophy, tobe awarded as determined by the Commanding Officer of the said Naval Militia."

There is a cash award that accompanies the award: \$300 for the individual and \$300 to be distributed evenly among the unit members. The format for the award is simple:

In an Email or in a Letter nominate a member

or unit based on the outstanding things they have done during the prior NY State Fiscal Year (April 1, 2022 to March 31, 2023). The exact details are in the Josephthal Trophy Instruction:

Key elements for consideration:

- The individual must be a member in good standing of the NY Naval Militia.
- A Unit may be an Ad Hoc or formal Unit of the NY Naval Militia or the Navy, Marine Corps or Coast Guard reserves. If a unit is nominated at least 50% of the unit must be members of the NY Naval Militia.
- Performance of duty or accomplishment must be described in detail enough to justify the award.
- 4. The members must be up to date in medical readiness.
- 5. If a unit is nominated a roster of the members must be include in the nomination.

Chief of Staff News:

Many of our members deserve special recognition for their extraordinary efforts while on State Active Duty (SAD). However, lack of quality award input, misconceptions about Federal award eligibility, and unfamiliar State award processes frequently prevent, misdirect, or discourage recognition of our members. Thus, here are some tips to improve your chances of successfully nominating your top performers for special recognition while supporting an operation:

If asked, neither be bashful, slow, nor shy about providing quality award input. Otherwise, given the tight deadlines at the end

of an operation, when such input is generally requested, you may not be asked again. Rather, view the request like any other assignment that you would normally complete to the very best of your ability and ensure your team does as well. Specifically, invest the time and effort needed to quantify and clearly impact of your team communicate the effort members' extra upon mission accomplishment. For example, input of, "Volunteered to stand eight 12-hour watches due to being the sole site member qualified to operate a Class III 6,000-pound forklift to facilitate loading up to 55 pallets per day of the heaviest and most urgently needed COVID supplies onto up to 5 tractor trailer trucks per day and deliver a total of over 810 pallets or material to 10 different distribution points scattered across the State," Is far more useful than, "Provided long hours and rare skills as needed to move numerous pallets of cargo to several sites."

Exact data are always preferable but often unavailable. Thus, reasonable estimates of accomplishments and impact based upon sound supporting logic are frequently necessary and completely acceptable. example, if your site averaged loading 45 pallets a day during the first 18-days or your 20-day assignment, you could reasonably estimate having moved over 810 pallets by the end of your assignment. Therefore, always consider creatively wavs generate to reasonable estimates if needed rather than providing no data for lack of exact data.

Ensure your nominating chain of command realizes that NYNM members solely completing SAD must be nominated for State, rather than Federal, awards. Otherwise, well-meaning, but misguided, nominations for Federal Army or Air Force Achievement or Commendation medals are routinely denied and rarely salvaged and resubmitted as State award. Thereby wasting a great deal of time and effort and resulting in no recognition. Why?

Because SAD is solely State, rather than Federal, duty and solely subject to State award authorizations and regulations. Thus, a Federal award is neither authorized nor appropriate even if the nominee is a drilling Reservist or the mission transitions to a Federally authorized Title 32 event for Army and Air National Guard members. Rather, only State personal awards are appropriate for NYNM members solely completing SAD under any circumstance.

If your nominating command unfamiliar with State awards, refer them to DMNA Regulation Number 672-1 which prescribes the proper justification, format, and processing of nominations for State military awards and is available via the following DMNA web page: https://dmna.ny.gov/forms/dmna reg 672-No, "fill in the blanks," form applies. Rather, State nominations are made via a memorandum and accompanying draft citation formatted per Regulation 672-1. While later nominations are possible and occasionally approved, the best and most appropriate chance of nominating your top performers is via your operational chain of command and the J1 shop of the JTF that you are supporting toward the end of an operation or a significant period of SAD for one of your team members.

Similarly, download and read Regulation 672-1 as well to ensure your nominations are as consistent with its required justification and format as possible. example, while there are four levels of State personal military awards, nomination for the Military Commendation Medal will typically be most appropriate unless truly extraordinary circumstances clearly warrant nomination for a higher award. JTF J1 shops are far more likely help you smooth and fully submit appropriately justified nominations that at least approximate the required format. Thus, refer to Regulation 672-1 for a description of the typical justification and format for each award.

While you cannot wear State awards while on Federal military duty, you can and should setup a second set of ribbons to wear them while on SAD. They will also help support your consideration for additional NYNM assignments and advancement upon your retirement from the USNR/USMCR/USCGR.

In summary, please remember that recognizing your best performers is part of good leadership and award input need not be letter-perfect. Rather, simply providing the detailed factual data required to single out your noteworthy top performers and ensure it flows through the appropriate State, rather than Federal, nomination formats and processes is at least 75% of the task.


NYNM Staff Visits Asylum Seeker Sites

Several NYNM staff personnel visited a number of the hotels and control centers of the Asylum Seekers mission in NY City during the first weeks of January. Traveling between the sites were NYNM Chief of Staff CAPT Mike Perry, NYNM Commander RDML Larry Weill, along with MGySgt Rignola and SSgt Erik Tjornhom

The group was able to move between many of the sites used to house the Asylum Seeker residents, including almost a dozen of the hotel spread between the facilities various Burroughs of the city. It was a real eye opener, as the staff was able to see and hear first-hand the various challenges encountered by the personnel stationed in those sites. Considering the diverse background of these service members, including their different assigned service branches, they have been able to quickly form team relationships that have been fully functional and superbly responsive.

"One of the most impressive observations we've made is that many of the personnel assigned here are fully-fluent in Spanish, which enhances the communications and trust level with the residents," noted RDML Weill.

The service members assigned to duty in the hotels are tasked with a great many responsibilities, including security, safety, administrative matters, monitoring the daily meal plan, and more. So far, they have exceeded all expectations in ensuring that the residents' messing and berthing needs are met and that everyone is fully cared for in each facility. The mission appears to be expanding in both size and duration, so stand by for updates as they become available.

Awards Ceremony at COVID Warehouse in Geneva

An awards ceremony was conducted for NYNM members at the COVID-19 supply warehouse in Geneva, NY on Friday, November 18. Recognized for their superb efforts and dedication to the mission were Senior Chief Scott Pease and Petty Officer DaShawn Bradley.

Both of these Militiamen have been on long-term SAD orders at the Geneva facility, working long hours to ensure that health care facilities across the region have the COVID supplies needed to combat the deadly virus. The facility contains such vast stores of supplies it defies the imagination. CAPT Dutcher, who helped present the awards with RDML Weill, likened it to the warehouse in the movie "Raiders of the Lost Ark." Managing that facility takes continuous care and vigilance.

Senior Chief has been attached to the COVID mission since shortly after its inception. He has been tasked with overseeing the entire warehouse mission along with its crew of State military members.



Petty Officer Bradley has been an invaluable contributor inside the facility, both moving and transporting the supplies as well as serving as an instructor on fork truck and other devices.

The warehouse itself may be closing sometime within the next six months as the COVID mission winds down. However, the State of New York is highly indebted to the work of these two NYNM members for their outstanding efforts in keeping the facility running at peak capacity throughout the duration of the mission.

We are also still very involved in the New York City mission to support the influx of immigrants seeking asylum in the US. At the time of this article, we have 150 NYNM service members on this mission. This mission began in mid-October and with no projected end date at this time we are always looking for interested NYNM members to add to our stand-by list. We have service members at most of the 33 mission sites in and around NYC, Queens, Brooklyn, Staten Island and Harlem. If you would like to be screened, added to the list, and considered for any open position that becomes available, call the office main line (518) 786-4583.

As always, please help me keep our readiness up by notifying me of any change to your pay

grade, unit, address or contact information. We do not have access to any federal system. If you are a member who is separated or retired from your federal component, an annual medical is required on our forms 88 & 93 to be eligible for State Active-Duty orders and remain a member. These can be found on our website under forms and instructions.





MEBS Kick-Off Weekend 2023



Spring is the beginning of the traditional boating season in New York State.
