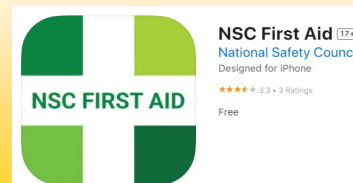

- 24% of weather-related vehicle crashes occur on snowy, slushy or icy pavement and 15% happen during snowfall or sleet.
- Over 1,300 people are killed and more than 116,800 people are injured in vehicle crashes on snowy, slushy or icy pavement annually.

BE READY FOR FALL RIDES!

Fall rides often feature beautiful, scenic views, but they also pose some unique hazards.

Adaptable Riding Gear

The weather in fall is transitional and may change abruptly. Adaptable riding gear is a great idea.

Beware of Poor Visibility

The sun is typically at a lower angle in the sky. Shadows may become longer, darker and occur earlier in the day than during mid-summer. Wearing lightly tinted shades or a helmet with a retractable sunshade can help improve vision into those dark shadows.

Watch for More Active Wildlife

Wild animals tend to become more active in autumn due to mating, migration or foraging. Throttle down, cover your brake and be prepared to take evasive action or hard stopping.

Beware of Traction Surprises

On lightly traveled roads, overnight frost can linger on road surfaces into the latter part of the morning. Frost can be as slick as ice, so be alert.

Preliminary 2023–2024 U.S. Flu In-Season Disease Burden Estimates

Because influenza surveillance does not capture all cases of flu, CDC provides these estimated ranges to better reflect the full burden of flu in the United States. These estimates are calculated using a mathematical model based on CDC's weekly influenza surveillance data and are preliminary and are updated weekly throughout the season.

DID YOU KNOW?



Clean off your vehicle before driving. Flying snow from cars causes accidents.



Keep it slow, and don't use cruise control. Roads can be slick even if they just look wet.



Leave extra distance between vehicles. Stay especially far from snow plows.
