Historically, the Army loses about 10 Soldiers between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day. Too often, these tragedies stem from private motor vehicle accidents, with speeding, failure to wear seat belts, and alcohol use as leading factors.

This year, we can change that story. As the holiday season draws near, remember that safety is a mission we all share. As stated by the Secretary of the Army in a recently released message, *Just Pick Up During the Holidays*, "we're all in this together." Leaders, stay engaged with your Soldiers, understand their holiday plans, and reinforce the importance of making sound decisions — especially on the road. Soldiers, remain vigilant in every off-duty activity and continue to look out for your battle buddies. Whether at home or on the road, risk management must remain a priority.

Holiday Tree Safety Tips

Ensure a merry and bright holiday season by safely maintaining your tree with the following tips.

Keep away from heat:

Make sure your tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like an airduct, fireplace or space heater.



Examine cords:

Examine extension cords and lights for signs of damage.

Frayed electric cords should be discarded.

Keep It watered:

Fill the water reservoir daily and check the condition of the trunk bark and branches for moisture. Shedding or dry needles could mean the tree is drying out, increasing overall fire risks.

Don't Climb Alone

Never climb a ladder to string lights or hang ornaments without someone to watch or help.



Be Firm

Set up the ladder so that it's on a firm, secure and level foundation.



Take Your Time

Never rush while hanging holiday lights and decorations.



Be Afraid of Heights

Don't stand above the three rungs from the top of a step-ladder.



Practice the 3-Point Rule

Always have three points of contact while on the ladder (two hands, one foot or two feet, one hand).

DECORATE YOUR HOME SAFELY DURING THE HOLIDAYS:

According to the National Fire Protection Association, 860 home fires caused by holiday decorations occur **each year**. An additional 210 home fires are caused by Christmas trees per year. Follow these steps to ensure you decorate your home safely during the winter holidays.

Indoor Use Only Make sure all **extension cords** and **electrical decorations** are marked for **proper use**

Outdoor electric lights and decorations should be plugged into circuits protected by **ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs)**

Exercise caution when decorating near power lines. Keep yourself and your equipment at least **10 feet** from power lines

Avoid overloading electrical outlets with too many decorations or electrical devices. They can **overheat and cause a fire**

Never connect more than three strings of incandescent lights together

Water your Christmas tree **daily**

Purchase electrical decorations from reputable retailers and that are approved by a national recognized testing lab such as **UL** (Underwriters Laboratories), **Intertek (ETL)**, or **Canadian Standards Association (CSA)**

Did you know? A heat source too close to the Christmas tree causes **1 in every 4** winter fires.

As you deck the halls this season, be fire smart. Make sure your tree is **at least 3 feet away** from heat sources like fireplaces, radiators and space heaters.

 

WINTER DRIVING PREP

Prepare Your Car to Give Winter Mishaps the Cold Shoulder

- Test your battery.
- Check the engine cooling system.
- Have winter tires with a deeper, more flexible tread put on your car.
- If using all-season tires, check the tread and replace if less than 2/32 of an inch.
- Check the tire pressure - tire pressure drops as the temperature drops.
- Check your wiper blades.
- Add wiper fluid rated for -30 degrees.
- Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid the gas line freezing up.
